


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Kindergarten Registration

Tully Team Wins Academic Decathlon



The Tully High School Academic Decathlon team won the New York State Academic Decathlon Championship held at SUNY College at Brockport on February 23-24, to claim its first overall title in that competition. Our team has been a competitor for the title for many years, but this was its first overall state win. The state title is determined by the highest scoring school, regardless of size, and Tully was one of the smallest schools in the competition. Our team, coached by Mr. Votra, earned the right to compete in the 2018 USAD Nationals on April 19-21 in Frisco, Texas

The Academic Decathlon is widely considered to be one of the premier academic competitions for high school students in the country, and the level of study is well beyond most high school curriculum. Each team is comprised of two or three each of students ...continued on page 4...

Pre-K News



Learning about light helped to brighten up Pre-K during the month of January! During the "Luminous Light" unit, students learned about the sun, moon, stars and shadows. In one lesson, Mrs. Hendricks' and Mrs. Pickard's classes worked together to answer the question, "What color is light?"

All students started with an observation chart where each student colored using the one color they thought light was. Most students chose yellow, while a few chose orange. After sharing their thinking, students used diffraction circles, "magic glasses" and transparent prisms to discover light can be many colors! Once the experimenting was complete, students used water color and painted on their observation chart using all the colors of light they saw. Students had so much fun and loved the hands-on experience and discovery.

Grade 3 News: Water Study



Currently this year in the third-grade classroom, we are learning and researching a multitude of topics and facts pertaining to water and the important roles it plays around the world. Third-grade students have been learning where water is on earth and how it is all connected through one well. Consequently, they are also deepening their understanding of their overall dependence on earth's limited water supply through several informational texts on the topic of water. In examining the water cycle, students will work in the Maker Lab with Mrs. Meldrim, our school librarian, to create water filters that will aim to help in the fight against pollution. In addition, students will also be creating a public service announcement supporting their opinion to educate others of the importance of freshwater.

These young students have shown excitement to learn about all the forms of water, where to find water around the world, and the limited supply available to certain places and people. What an eye opening experience for our students to not only obtain valuable information, but to also be active in helping fight pollution and spreading knowledge to other students.

First Grade Inquiring Minds

First grade students are beginning the science unit of study, entitled *Patterns in the Sky.* We started off this unit of study by asking students what they wonder about when they think of the sun, moon, stars and Earth. By begin-



ning our unit this way, our students are engaged in inquiry-based learning. With inquiry-based learning, our students actively seek information and answers to their own questions. Our students are highly motivated to find the answers to the questions they have posed, and their natural curiosity leads them to ask more questions!

As we explore the patterns in the sky, some questions students hope to answer include: How does the sun set? How big is Earth? Is the moon hot? What is Earth made of? How do stars glow? How does the Earth move around? How does the moon get small and big?

We will be very busy in first grade, searching for answers to our many questions!

Yearbook News:

Students Work Together to Create a Yearbook, Capture Memories to Last a Lifetime

Sixth grade students are discovering how much is involved in the creation of a yearbook. Fifteen students meet regularly with two advisors to collaborate on the 2017-2018 Tully Elementary School Yearbook. One of their first jobs was to elect officers of the club (president vice president, secretary, and treasurer) who take on specific responsibilities to help the club run well.



All members of the club learn the importance of setting a meeting agenda, recording minutes, arriving at decisions through consensus, and meeting deadlines. Meeting after school, during activity period, allows the opportunity to develop a sales and advertising plan, use software to design the pages, and discuss the progress of the year-book. Club members shared what a great educational experience it is to be able to learn and use the software to design the pages. They enjoy capturing memories through the use of candid pictures. The group looks forward to distributing the yearbook in June. "It is our hope that students can look back on the year through their yearbook," said Brynn Patrick, President of the Elementary School Yearbook Club.

NYS Assessment Information

A message from the TES & JSHS Principals

From April 10 - 17, 2018, Tully students in grades 3 - 8 will take the NYS English Language Arts (ELA) Assessment. The Math Assessments will be given May 1st - May 8th. We encourage all students to participate in the state assessments to help us improve our program and best meet the learning needs of individual students. This month, we would like to provide more information about the composition of the ELA Assessment as well as introduce computer-based-testing.

The ELA Assessment is designed to be administered over two consecutive days and includes three types of questions: multiple choice, short-response, and extended-response. Multiple choice questions are used to gauge reading comprehension. Short-response questions require short written responses to reading passages, while extended-response questions require longer responses to the reading selections. These reading selections may come from a variety of grade-level appropriate sources, including novels, articles, poems, and first-hand accounts. All three question types assess student achievement of reading comprehension and language conventions, and the written responses provide for measuring the achievement of writing standards. There is no time limit to complete any session of the test. Teachers have modeled their local assessments after the state assessments to reflect these types of questions, so our students are comfortable with the design of these exams and the performance expectations.

At Tully this year all students will take both the ELA and Math assessments in the computer-based-testing format (CBT). Last school year, students in grades 3 and 7 completed their assessments using CBT and it was a smooth administration, prompting us to utilize it for all students in 2018. The content tested is the same as the paper-based versions and we are helping students prepare for the experience by providing additional time during the school day to work with the Chromebooks and become familiar with the layout of the assessments. The testing schedule will be as follows:

with A averages (Honors division), with B averages (Scholastic division), and with C averages (Varsity division) who compete against participants in other schools from within their respective divisions. The United States Academic Decathlon establishes a yearly theme for the competition, which is made up of 10 academic events: math, science, economics, literature, music, art, social science, speech, interview and essay writing. This year's theme was Africa, and the topics of all of the written academic tests related to that area. Awards are set on an Olympic model, where gold, silver, and bronze medals are awarded in each category for each grade point division. Each student competes for individual medals and their total scores count for the team total.

Our team consists of Rachel Berry, Daniel Bort, Peyton Wolf, Gerrit VanDyne, Ryan Gordona, Joanna Case, Marypearl Echard, and Ryan Huggins. The team collected a total of 30 medals out of the total possible 90 medals available to win in the tournament. Medal winners for Tully were: Joanna Case who medaled in 9 of the 10 subjects (3 gold, 3 silver, 3 bronze), Peyton Wolf (5 silver), Marypearl Echard (1 gold, 2 silver, 3 bronze), Daniel Bort (2 gold, 1 bronze), Ryan Huggins (3 silver), Ryan Gordona (1 gold, 1 silver, 1 bronze), Rachel Berry (1 silver), Gerrit VanDyne (1 silver). Alternate members of the Tully team (Moira McAninch, Haley Fowler-Conner, Matt Doolittle, Caitlin Halliday, Austin Taubman, and Madalynn Wiers) competed for alternate medals against the opponents' alternates. Moira McAninch won three alternate medals, while Haley Fowler-Conner won two and Matt Doolittle won one.

In addition to winning the state title and more than one-third of the total medals, Peyton Wolf was recognized by winning the Trevor Cook Spirit Trophy, so named for a former medal-winning competitor from Lyndonville, NY who lost his life in service to our country.

Nominating Petitions

Three terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2018. Each winner will be elected for three year terms from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021 at the annual school district election to be held on May 15, 2018.

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. This nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, Tully Central School District Offices, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than 5:00 pm on April 16, 2018. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures.

Under the law a qualified voter is one who is entitled to vote at a school district election. To be entitled to vote a person must meet these three qualifications:

- · A citizen of the US
- At least 18 years of age
- A resident of the school district for a period of at least 30 days prior to the election.

From the Superintendent



On April 3rd, our Board of Education will adopt a proposed 2018-19 school budget. Built into this proposed school budget is funding to support a second full-time agriculture teacher at the JSHS, and funding to support a Capital Outlay Project. This proposed budget maintains the school district's reliance on fund balance at less than 2% of budgeted revenue, and keeps the local tax levy increase at approximately 2%.

Currently, we employ one full-time agriculture teacher. If the Tully community approves the 2018-19 school budget, we will eliminate our current part-time family and consumer science teaching position, and hire a second full-time agriculture teacher. In the spring of 2017, the New York State Board of Regents changed regulations related to the middle level family and consumer science curriculum. This change allows school districts to teach the family and consumer science curriculum through the lens of agricultural education. For Tully

Schools, this means we have an opportunity to build upon one of our strengths, specifically agricultural education.

A Capital Outlay Project is a capital improvement to our facility, with total costs of under \$100,000. Funding for a Capital Outlay Project must initially come from a school district's operating budget (i.e.: the proposed 2018-19 school budget). Schools then receive New York State building aid on this expense in the following school year. At our current building aid reimbursement level, New York State would reimburse Tully schools for approximately 75% of this capital expenditure during the 2019-20 school year. Should the Tully community approve the 2018-19 school budget, we anticipate undertaking a Capital Outlay Project to replace part of the HVAC system at the JSHS. The HVAC equipment we are looking to replace is approximately 40 years old, and at the end of its useful life. The work included in this proposed Capital Outlay Project falls outside of the scope of our larger 2018 Capital Project. This work would most likely be completed during the spring of 2019.

Finally, the proposed 2017-18 school budget calls for a local tax levy increase of approximately 2%. We anticipate that State Aid will remain flat from year to year. Since the proposed 2018-19 school budget calls for approximately a 1% increase in spending, any increase in State Aid would be used to reduce reliance on appropriated fund balance (savings).

Please note, our annual Public Budget Hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, May 8th, beginning at 6:00 pm, in the JSHS library. The Public Budget Hearing is an opportunity for members of our community to learn more about the proposed 2018-19 school budget, and to ask questions regarding this proposed budget.
