#### **P2 Update**

Tully Elementary students and staff welcomed Jill Walsh to our February Positivity Project assembly. Ms. Walsh is an Ironman (triathlon: swim 2.4 miles, bike 112 miles, and run 26.2 miles back to back in one day), a three-time world champion cyclist, and a double silver medalist winner in Paralympic cycling. Ms. Walsh shared her

story of loving to run, bike, and swim. She spoke to our students about a time in her life when these activities became more difficult for her. It was then she shared that she had been

diagnosed, not too long ago, with MS (multiple sclerosis).

MS had started making cycling and running difficult for her. MS affected her balance when biking and running. She found that cycling on two wheels was a struggle because she would fall when she needed to stop her bike. One of the many inspirational things Ms. Walsh said during the assembly was, "When something got hard, I had to adjust. I had to find a different way." A man named Steven Peace introduced her to racing on a trike. It was hard at first, but she was determined and persevered to learn to race on it.

And persevere she did! In 2014, Ms. Walsh became The United States Champion of paracycling. She earned a spot on the United States Paracycling Team and won a silver medal in the world championships. In 2016, she competed in the Paralympics in Rio and earned two silver medals in paracycling. The whole school got to see her Olympic medals up close. Her next goal is to compete in Tokyo in 2020! One of the many lessons our students took away from her presentation was, "If it matters to you, you'll find a way. If it doesn't matter, you'll find an excuse."

#### **Congratulations Decathlons**

The Tully High School Academic Decathlon team made a strong showing at the State Academic Championship held at SUNY College at Brockport on February 8-9, claiming third place.

The Academic Decathlon is widely considered to be one of the premier academic competitions for high school students in the country, and the level of study is well beyond most high school curriculum. Each team is comprised up to three each of students with A averages (Honors division), B averages (Scholastic division), and C averages (Varsity division), who compete against participants in other schools from within their respective divisions. The United States Academic Decathlon establishes a yearly theme for the competition, which is made up of 10 academic events: math, science, economics, literature, music, art,



social science, speech, interview and essay writing. This year's theme was the Sixties, and the topics of all of the written academic tests related to that area. Awards are set on an Olympic model, where gold, silver, and bronze medals are awarded in each category for each grade point division. Each student competes for individual medals and their total scores count for the team total.

Our team consists of Rachel Berry, Ellie Ives, Moira McAninch, Caitlin Halladay, Alex Wiers, Marypearl Echard, and Ethan Vaughn. Medal winners for Tully were: Marypearl Echard (5 gold, 2 bronze), Caitlin Halladay (3 silver, 2 bronze), Alex Wiers (3 gold, 1 silver), Rachel Berry (2 silver, 1 bronze), Ellie Ives (1 gold, 1 bronze), Moira McAninch (2 bronze), and Ethan Vaughn (1 bronze). Alternates for the team included Bailey Albro, Dante Bertolo, Arielle Ringhiser, and Natalie Slazik, with Bailey, Dante, and Natalie each winning a medal for being the highest scorer in an event amongst all alternates. In addition, both Marypearl Echard and Ellie Ives were chosen to participate in the Speech Showcase, a celebration of the speeches that judges thought were the most important for their peers to hear.

### A Message From the TES & JSHS Principals

**NYS Assessment Information** 

Between April 1 - 8, 2019, Tully students in grades 3 - 8 will take the NYS English Language Arts (ELA) Assessment. The Math Assessments will be given between April 30 - May 7, 2019. We encourage all students to participate in the state assessments to help us improve our program and best meet the learning needs of individual students. This month, we would like to provide more information about the composition of the ELA Assessment as well as introduce computer-based-testing.

The ELA Assessment is designed to be administered over two consecutive days and includes three types of questions: multiple choice, short-response, and extended-response. Multiple

choice questions are used to gauge reading comprehension. Short-response questions require short written responses to reading passages, while extended-response questions require longer responses to the reading selections. These reading selections may come from a variety of grade-level appropriate sources, including novels, articles, poems, and first-hand accounts. All three question types assess student achievement of reading comprehension and language conventions, and the written responses provide for measuring the achievement of writing standards. There is no time limit to complete any session of the test. Teachers have modeled their local assessments after the state assessments to reflect these types of questions so our students are comfortable with the design of these exams and the performance expectations.

Students will take both the ELA and Math assessments in the computer-based-testing format (CBT). The content tested is the same as the paper-based versions and we are helping students prepare for the experience by providing additional time during the school day to work with the Chromebooks and become familiar with the layout of the assessments. #### From the Superintendent



On March 18th, the Tully CSD Board of Education adopted a proposed 2019-20 school budget of \$20,844,017. This proposed budget maintains all of our existing curricular, co-curricular and athletic programs, and includes funding to support our busleasing program. Additionally, this proposed budget maintains the school district's reliance on appropriated fund balance (our savings) at less than 1% of budgeted revenue, and keeps the local tax levy increase below 2%.

Over the past four years we have added several new opportunities for our students, including driver education, pre-kindergarten, junior high school agriculture courses (including a junior high FFA club), and a 1:1 computer initiative. The proposed 2019-20 budget supports these opportunities for our students, as well as all of the other opportunities Tully Schools have traditionally afforded our students.

Currently, the district is in the sixth year of its bus-leasing program. This bus-leasing program has contained and stabilized transportation costs related to purchasing and maintaining our fleet of school buses. Going forward, the district is now in a position to use funds from the general fund budget to cover costs associated with any new bus leases. Doing this eliminates the need to ask the community for additional funds outside of the general fund budget for the purpose of leasing buses.

Finally, the proposed 2019-20 school budget calls for a local tax levy increase of less than 2%. We anticipate that our overall State Aid will increase by approximately 9%. Much of this State Aid increase will come in the form of Building Aid, and is dedicated to offsetting expenses related to our current Capital Project. Foundation Aid, which we use to offset general operating expenses, is projected to increase by less than 2%.

Please note, our annual Public Budget Hearing is scheduled for Monday, May 13th, beginning at 6:00 p.m., in the JSHS library. The Public Budget Hearing is an opportunity for members of our community to learn more about the proposed 2019-20 school budget, and to ask questions regarding this proposed budget.

## Nominating Petitions Available for Board of Education Positions

Two terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2019. Each winner will be elected for three year terms from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2022 at the annual school district election to be held on May 21, 2019.

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. This nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, Tully Central School District Offices, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 22, 2019. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures.

Under the law, a qualified voter is one who is entitled to vote at a school district election. To be entitled to vote, a person must meet these three qualifications:

- A citizen of the United States At least 18 years of age
- A resident of the school district for a period of at least 30 days prior to the election.

Tully's FIRST Tech Challenge team 8863 competed over February break at the Vermont FIRST Tech Challenge State Championships. There were 32 teams in competition that traveled from states all over the north east including Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Rhode Island, and New York.

The team is judged over many areas including the team's connection with the community, working with experts, describing problem solving, and the design process; describing the efficiency and effectiveness of the parts of the robot; use of sensors and unique aspects of their robot.
