6th Grade Carnival



The annual 6th grade Carnival was held on June 7th in the Elementary Gym. Sixth graders worked in small groups to write a proposal, come up with a design, and then build a carnival game (completely of cardboard) for all grade levels to enjoy. The carnival is the culminating event, resulting from library research on charitable organizations and the statistics and probability unit in math.

Students worked with Mrs. Meldrim in the library to research and evaluate a

reputable, non-profit organization. They then created a Google Slides presentation to share their research with their peers, who voted to choose a deserving charity. Mended Little Hearts was selected to receive all proceeds. The mission of Mended Little Hearts is to provide services to patients and families of children with congenital heart disease.

Once the organization was decided upon, the students wrote a proposal letter pitching their idea for a carnival game.

The letter included the name and object of the game, a statistical question that could be answered by collecting data during the carnival, and a description of the game. Once the proposal was approved, production began. Students worked collaboratively to construct their game while problem solving when an original design idea didn't quite work out the way it was planned. After five class periods of construction, the builders were ready to showcase their games at the school-wide carnival. Every grade level was able to attend the carnival during their special area time. All students enjoyed the chance to play games and win prizes. The carnival was a great success!

Fourth Grade Road Trip



The fourth grade social studies curriculum is all about New York State. Students learn all about the Haudenosaunee, colonial times, immigration, industrialization, westward expansion with the Erie Canal, and New York State Government throughout the fourth grade year, all the while, making connections to the here and now.

It is one thing to read about how the Erie Canal contributed to the growth of New York and the nation; it is another to go back in time and experience it in real life. This year, students visited Chittenango Landing where they were able to participate in many activities, bringing them back in time to learn about life along the canal. Using their archeological skills, students dug for artifacts that told the story of people along the canal. Students participated in a scavenger hunt, locating important buildings and learning their purpose, visited a blacksmith who taught them the process of forging metal and learned all about locks and dry docks along the canal with hands on demonstrations.

One of our most anticipated "road trips" each year is our day spent at Albany. This beautiful city has so much to offer our students including being able to see our own state assemblymen and women in action. In addition to the Capitol Building, students also toured the New York State Museum, bringing learning to life. From exploring a replica of a longhouse to walking the streets of New York City, there are curricular connections around every corner.

Second, congratulations to our sixth graders, the members of the Class of 2025. As they enter seventh grade, they will be making the transition from the Elementary School to the Junior/Senior High School. With this transition, comes additional responsibility and additional opportunities.

Third, congratulations to our retirees. At the conclusion of the 2018-19 school year, we had seven members of our faculty and staff retire (see photo on page 7). Collectively, this group of retirees had 183 years of service with the

Tully Central School District. I would like to say thank you to this group of people for the work they have done over the years.


