Meet Your 2021 Safety Patrol

On December 18th, Tully Elementary School held its AAA Safety Patrol training for 25 volunteer 5th and 6th grade students led by Melinda Hathaway, School Social Worker, and Ray Herrick, Director of Safety and Security for the district. The AAA Safety Patrol recruits students who work well with others, considers the feelings of others, expresses friendliness, leads by example, and are respectful, responsible, and safe.

Our 5th and 6th grade Safety Patrol Officers are responsible for ensuring the safety of students during arrival and dismissal times. We have three types of Safety Patrol duties: Bus Patrols, State Street Patrols, and Sidewalk Patrols. These Patrol Officers are responsible for escorting younger students on and off the bus and help to enforce the school safety rules while walking to and from the school building. Safety Patrol Officers started their duties on Tuesday, January 5th, after a Meet and Greet with their fellow PK - 3rd grade students, who they will be assisting during arrival and dismissal times.

We would like to congratulate our new Captains and Lieutenants for the first six weeks of patrol: Captain Trevor Litz and Lieutenant Alexandra Dickson who will serve as our morning Safety Patrol Officers; Captain Andie Fairchild and Lieutenant Tyler Wood who will serve as our afternoon Safety Patrol Officers. The Captain's responsibility will be to enforce the rules of Safety Patrol, take attendance of Safety Patrol Officers, fill in for absent Patrol Officers, and report back to the Safety Patrol supervisors. The Lieutenant's responsibilities will be to fill in for the Captain or other Patrol Officers should they be absent. New Captains and Lieutenants will be elected every six weeks.

2020 Maker Lab Creations



Maker Lab at the elementary was in full swing this past fall with Wendy Fowler-Conner and Nathan Keefe as co-advisors for the club. There were two groups that participated: a cohort for grades 2-3 and one for grades 4-6. Each group consisted of about a dozen students, and both in-person and remote students were able to participate. Each group met via Zoom to create different projects. For all Maker Lab participants, a bag with supplies for each project was sent home for each member to use. Projects were a mix of crafts and gadgets, and students were encouraged to be as creative as they could. Four projects were completed, all with the common theme of using wooden clothespins: a turkey craft, a clothes pin racer, a catapult, and a snowman craft. During meetings, students previewed upcoming projects and shared their completed creations with the group. The Maker Lab advisors are planning a winter session and a spring session as well this year, with the same basic format. Parents will be emailed information about how to sign their child up prior to each session.

As you may recall, the Junior Senior High School had the good fortune of adding a social worker to our staff this school year. Mrs. Morasco works alongside our school counselors, Mrs. Newton and Mrs. Davin. Together, they provide support, assistance, and guidance for our students in many different ways.

Mrs. Newton and Mrs. Davin work with grades 7-9 and 10-12, respectively. Their jobs entail counseling students in the following areas: guiding students with decision making while understanding their strengths and areas for improvement; scheduling of classes; career and college planning; advocating for students' academic, social, and emotional needs; and developing skills for a variety of situations. Mrs. Newton is also the Alcohol-Drug Abuse Prevention Education Program counselor for all of our students. Mrs. Morasco works with families and students in grades 7-12 who need assistance in the following areas: personal and social development; psychological issues; substance abuse and other at-risk behaviors; individual and group therapies for a variety of situations; and directing families to outside resources.

Our counselors and social worker collaborate on numerous items while communicating with each other regularly to provide a student-centered, team approach to assisting students. They are all available for crisis intervention, one-to-one counseling, and advocating for students' needs. We are very fortunate to have three individuals who care deeply about our students. Private Transportation Requests Due April 1st

NYS Education Law Section 3635(2) requires that a written request be made to the Board of Education of a School District when transportation of a student to a non-public, private or parochial school is required. This written request must be made annually and received by the school district no later than April 1st for transportation for the next school year.

Most non-public schools have a form available to make this request and can be contacted for assistance. Please have these written requests sent to Attn: Jamie Wortley, Tully Central School District, Business Office, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than April 1, 2021.

From the Superintendent



Several articles in this issue of the Knight Insight highlight student activities that might occur during a typical school year. For example, our Elementary School students have been involved with activities in the Maker Lab and on Safety Patrol, our Junior/Senior High School students held a Spirit Week, and all of our students are still involved in the Positivity Project. Our school

community is working hard to maintain some sense of normalcy for our students during this pandemic.

On the other hand, we are also experiencing some things that are not typical as a result of this pandemic. We have all been wearing masks and conscientiously social distancing. Many of our students have had to learn remotely while under quarantine. Some of our teachers have had to teach remotely while under quarantine. On more than one occasion, we have had to pivot to remote instruction in order to allow time for contact tracing. On a handful of occasions, specific classrooms at our Elementary School have had to pivot to remote learning because someone in that classroom had tested positive for the Coronavirus.

I am hopeful that before this school year is done we will begin the process of returning to a more typical learning environment. As we make this transition, there will be four big challenges that we will need to work through. First, we will need to work with outside agencies to provide opportunities for members of our school community to get the Coronavirus vaccine. These agencies include Onondaga County and local health care providers. Second, we will need to figure out how to provide more in-person learning opportunities for our students, especially the Junior/Senior High School students. We have already begun the planning process for this. Third, we will need to figure out how to bring back athletic and co-curricular opportunities for our students. Athletic opportunities during the spring semester will be contingent upon the Governor's approval. Perhaps our biggest challenge, however, will be addressing the social and emotional needs of our students as more of them return to in-person learning. Helping our students make sense of their experiences during this pandemic, and helping them rebuild their lives, will take time and a concerted effort. Faculty and staff at both the Elementary School and the Junior/ Senior High School have been working steadily with students and families to address this concern.

Our strong sense of community and our willingness to support each other have enabled us to endure the hardships brought about by this pandemic. This sense of community and caring will also enable us to rebuild as we emerge from this pandemic over the next several months.

Nominating Petitions Available for Board of Education Positions

Three terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2021. Each winner will be elected for three year terms from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2024 at the annual school district election scheduled for May 18, 2021.

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. This nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, Tully Central School District Offices, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 19, 2021. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures.

Under the law a qualified voter is one who is entitled to vote at a school district election. To be entitled to vote a person must meet these three qualifications:

- A citizen of the United States.
- At least 18 years of age.
- A resident of the school district for a period of at least 30 days prior to the election.
