## Elementary School Safety Patrol

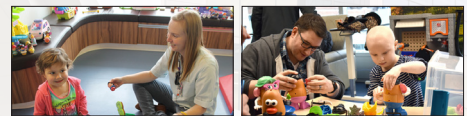

## Private Transportation Requests Due by April 1st

NYS Education Law Section 3635(2) requires that a written request be made to the Board of Education of a school district when transportation of a student to a non-public, private, or parochial school is required. This written request must be made annually and received by the school district no later than April 1st for transportation for the next school year. Most non-public schools have a form available to make this request and can be contacted for assistance. Please have these written requests sent to Attn: Theresa Flaherty, Tully Central School District, Business Office, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than April 1, 2019.

## Pre-K and Kindergarten Registration

In June, the Tully Central School District will hold screenings for incoming pre-kindergarten and kindergarten students who reside in the district. If you have not already done so, please register your child(ren) online at <http://www.tullyschools.org> by March 31, 2019.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, children must be district residents and turn 4 years of age, but not yet reach age 5, by December 1, 2019. For the 2019-2020 school year, Tully Elementary School is able to accommodate a maximum of 36 students in pre-kindergarten. If more than 36 students have been registered for pre-kindergarten by March 31, 2019, we will need to conduct a lottery to determine enrollment and organize a waiting list.

To enter kindergarten, children must be 5 years of age by December 1, 2019. Unlike pre-kindergarten, there is no limit on the number of district-resident kindergarten students who can be enrolled at Tully Elementary.

Information about the screening process for both grade levels will be mailed out to enrolled students in mid-May. Please don't hesitate to contact the elementary office at 696-6213 if you have specific questions about the registration or screening process.

## A Message from the TES & JSHS Principals

### NYS Assessment Information

While exact dates for specific grade levels have not yet been determined, this year's NYS Assessments in grades 3-8 will be administered across the state from April 1st - April 8th (ELA) and April 30th - May 7th (Math). As reminders for parents: first, the number of test sessions for each grade level has been reduced from three (3) days of testing to two (2) days of testing for each subject; and second, all Tully students will take their assessments in the computer-based testing (CBT) format using Google Chromebooks instead of the paper-based format. Last year, all of our students used the CBT assessment platform. Feedback from teachers and students was very positive in our district and across the state. We are excited to see how our students perform regionally and statewide!

At Tully, we use several measures, including student performance on the NYS assessments, to evaluate our curriculum and instructional program. We use NYS assessment results along with other standardized measures and classroom performance on homework, quizzes, tests, and projects, as well as communication with home to evaluate children at an individual level. The more information we have about student performance, the better we can make informed decisions about what adjustments to educational programs are necessary on both a district and individual student level. Over the past few years, the number of students whose parents have refused the administration of the NYS Assessments has steadily decreased. Just like last year, Tully had one of the highest percentages of student participation in Onondaga County allowing us to make better sense and generalization of the data to improve instruction. We would like to thank our families for participating in state testing to help us achieve our goals.

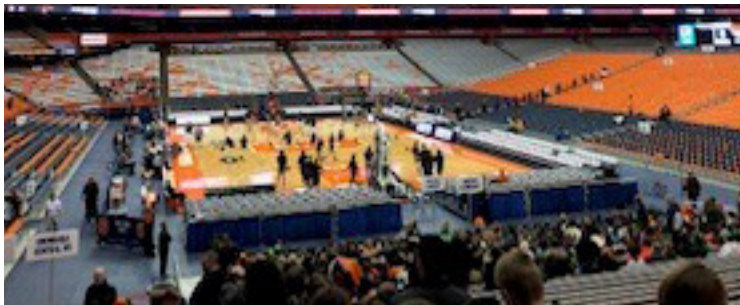
## Holiday Concert

## High School Art News

In the exhibit titled *"Americans Who Tell the Truth: Models of Courageous Citizenship"*, Shetterly portrays 238 portraits that represent Americans who use(d) their voice to advocate for values and issues they believe in. Subjects range from people who demonstrate(d) courage despite adversity to folks who stand up for what they believe to be right. Joining Shetterly on stage was Dr. Mona Hanna-Attisha, the pediatrician whose research exposed the high levels of lead in the water causing illness in the children of Flint, Michigan and Richard Bowen, the former Citi Bank employee who questioned the bank's subprime lending practices that ultimately led to the 2008 economic crisis.

Additionally, students enjoyed a walk on the SU campus taking in a beautiful winter's night view of the architecture and city lights. The lecture occurred in the Setnor Auditorium at Crouse College, the castle on the hill, and students were able to explore the building and its magnificent woodwork and stained glass features. All advanced studio art and photography students will be participating in a portrait project where they will create a portrait of someone in their life that is a model of bravery and citizenship or someone whose story they, as artists, are compelled to tell.

## 7th Grade Loretto Trip

On November 20, our 7th graders visited Loretto, an elder care facility, in Syracuse. This has been a Tully tradition for over 20 years! ## HS Photography



Cornell doctoral student, Berit Goodge, visited the Photography I classroom to teach students about the science (physics) of lenses. Berit is working on her Ph.D. in Applied Physics at Cornell University. Berit uses high-resolution electron microscopy for her research focused on understanding the atomic structure of materials used to make things such as phones, computers, batteries, etc. Photography students are learning about focal length and how to control focus using their digital cameras. Berit brought along some helpful hands-on light mapping activities and models that demonstrate what happens to light rays when they pass through a camera's lens.

## Nominating Petitions for Board of Education Positions

Two terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2019. Each winner will be elected for three year terms from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2022 at the annual school district election to be held on May 21, 2019.

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. This nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, Tully Central School District Offices, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 22, 2019. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures.

Under the law a qualified voter is one who is entitled to vote at a school district election. To be entitled to vote a person must meet these three qualifications:

- A citizen of the United States
- At least 18 years of age
- A resident of the school district for a period of at least 30 days prior to the election.

## From the Superintendent



Currently, all public schools in New York State are in the process of rolling out new learning standards in English Language Arts, math, science, social studies, technology, and the arts. The process of adopting new learning standards occurs over a long period of time, and each of these new sets of learning standards was adopted at a slightly different point in the past. So, while this may seem like a lot for schools to take on, it is in reality a manageable task.

The NYSED Board of Regents adopted new K-8 ELA and math learning standards in September of 2017. Beginning with this school year, we will begin the process of gradually aligning our PreK-8 curriculum to these new learning standards. Along the way, the 3-8 ELA and math assessments will gradually be revised to reflect these new learning standards. The goal is that by the 2020-21 school year, our PreK-8 curriculum will be fully aligned to these new learning standards, as will the 3-8 ELA and math assessments. This gradual process allows teachers to slowly shift our local curriculum and slowly modify the instructional practices they use, which provides our students with a more consistent learning experience.

The NYS Board of Regents adopted new science learning standards in July of 2017. These new science learning standards provide a K-12 science curriculum framework. Because these are K-12 learning standards, the process of adopting them will take a little longer, and it will involve revising the grade 4 and 8 science assessments and high school science regents exams.

The NYS Board of Regents adopted new social studies standards in April of 2014. Like the next generation science standards, these social studies standards are a K-12 framework, and involve revision of high school Regents exams. We anticipate we will have made a full transition to these new standards beginning with the 2020-21 school year.

Finally, the NYS Board of Regents adopted new standards in the arts and in technology during the 2016 school year. There are no state exams in art or technology, and so the adoption of new learning standards in these subject areas is a little less complicated, and typically happens a little more quickly. The expectation is that it should take one school year to become familiar with these new learning standards, prior to implementing them. Given this, we became familiar with these new standards during the 2017-18 school year, and have already made appropriate adjustments.

Given the cumulative and complicated nature of educating children, and given the changing nature of our world today, I expect that this process of rolling out new learning standards will not end anytime soon. I also would like to extend a word of thanks to our faculty and staff, who have been working steadily and diligently on all of the curriculum development initiatives listed above.
