At the time I am writing this article, the District is open for in-person learning. At the Junior Senior High School, we have pivoted to remote learning on two occasions for the purpose of contact tracing. This has far exceeded my expectations from when the school year started. The faculty and staff have worked tirelessly to provide the students with the best lessons possible while managing new technology and learning new software. Our custodial staff are the unsung heroes during the pandemic. They are constantly cleaning and sanitizing classrooms, restrooms, hallways, etc. Another unsung hero is our school nurse, Ms. Ganzhorn, who has advised countless parents, teachers, and students with issues related to their overall health and symptoms related to COVID-19. Transportation and Food Service have done so much more than they normally would to deliver school work and meals to our students. Clerical staff members have answered calls and emails to assist students and parents with a myriad of issues. Parents have been incredibly understanding about testing requirements, providing communication between themselves and the Health Department or primary care providers, and juggling the numerous robocalls and letters being sent by the District. The students cannot be left out for

their part: remote learners are making sacrifices to stay home and our in-person learners are following our new protocols quite well. For all of these reasons, I extend my sincerest gratitude for the many selfless actions everyone is taking to keep our staff and students safe and at school. In the event we pivot to remote learning for an extended period of time, I am confident that we will be able to maintain our current weekly schedule and provide our students with the valuable instruction they deserve.

Here are a few notes about yearly assessments: January Regents exams have been canceled by the New York State Education Department; 3-8 Math and ELA assessments are currently scheduled for later in the year; June Regents exams are scheduled as usual. If there are any changes, we will make sure to let students and parents know in a timely manner.

Lastly, I want to let our families know that the Board of Education graciously accepted my letter of retirement earlier this fall. I have been planning on 2021 being the year for a long time and I certainly did not think I would retire under such extraordinary circumstances! For all of the reasons mentioned above, I have enjoyed my 33 years at Tully as a teacher, coach, and administrator. Our district is truly a special place to learn and grow. Thank you to everyone who made my time here so enjoyable.

## "Handing Out" Gratitude with Teen Institute



## Nominating Petitions Available for Board of Education Positions

Three terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2021. Each winner will be elected for three year terms from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2024 at the annual school district election scheduled for May 18, 2021.

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. This nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, Tully Central School District Offices, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 19, 2021. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures.

Under the law a qualified voter is one who is entitled to vote at a school district election. To be entitled to vote a person must meet these three qualifications:

- A citizen of the United States.
- At least 18 years of age.
- A resident of the school district for a period of at least 30 days prior to the election.

## **From the Superintendent**



As a public school district, one of our primary responsibilities is to provide a safe and orderly learning environment for our students. The Tully Board of Education and every member of the Tully faculty and staff takes this responsibility very seriously.

During the 2020-21 school year, we will again conduct five types of safety drills. We will conduct bus safety drills, during which students

practice evacuating school buses. We will conduct fire drills, during which students practice evacuating school buildings. We will conduct an emergency evacuation drill, during which TES school students evacuate to the JSHS and JSHS students evacuate to TES. We will conduct lockdown drills, during which students practice sheltering in safe places within the school buildings. Additionally, we will conduct lockout drills, during which faculty and staff practice securing the perimeter of the schools. Concurrent to these safety drills, faculty and staff receive training on what to do in crisis situations. During this school year, we will be modifying these drills to incorporate social distancing measures.

Mr. Raymond Herrick will again serve as our Director of School Security and Safety this year. Mr. Herrick is responsible for assessing the effectiveness of our safety drills and for conducting faculty/staff training. He works closely with our social workers, our psychologist, our counselors, and our administrators to provide support for our students and their families. He acts as a first responder, should there be a critical incident, and he coordinates with other first responders (police, fire, paramedics). Police response time to our school campus, should there be a critical incident, can be as long as ten minutes or more. Because of this, we believe it is important that Mr. Herrick continue to be an armed presence on campus.

At the start of this school year, we hired two school monitors to assist with increased traffic flow during the morning drop off and afternoon pickup. Mr. Michael Rankin and Mr. Glen Wintermute both joined our staff back in September. Mr. Rankin has many years of experience with one of our local fire departments and Mr. Wintermute has many years of experience in law enforcement. Their primary responsibility has been to ensure that traffic flow on campus is safe and orderly. Given the increased number of parents driving children to and from school as a result of the current pandemic, Mr. Rankin's and Mr. Wintermute's efforts have been crucial.

Finally, this school year we again have our School Health & Safety Committee in place. This committee includes representatives from the Board of Education, the Tully Fire Department, the school district, and the Tully community at large. This committee has two areas of focus. The first is to provide oversight of our school safety initiatives, such as those listed above. The second is it to investigate and follow up on any safety concerns related to ongoing construction on our school campus.

## **Tully Parks and Recreation Update**


