Lesson Study



In January, a team of Tully Elementary teachers completed the second year of the 100K in 10 Grant, which is offered through a partnership with OCM-BOCES and The Smithsonian Science Education Center. The team of teachers from TES involved with this grant are Rachel Kolod, Abigail Lerch, Michele McNerney, Lisa Saile and Melissa Pickard.

Through this grant, teachers were provided training related to the science units developed by the Smithsonian Science Education Center, as well as professional development in how to conduct a formal lesson study. Tully teachers then worked with teachers from around the area to choose a specific element of a Smithsonian Science Lesson, which they then researched and evaluated. As a focus of their lesson study, the teachers chose making evidence-based claims and using accountable talk, within a 1st Grade Smithsonian Science Lesson.

For the specific lesson these teachers chose to study, first graders worked in the Maker Lab to answer the question "What is Needed to Make Sound?" As the first-grade lesson unfolded, the team of teachers watched and recorded student reactions, comments, questions and actions. After the lesson the team spent time debriefing and then made appropriate changes to the Smithsonian Science Lesson. It was an amazing experience for all who participated. A big thank you to TES first graders who helped the teachers learn and set the stage for future first grade students.

Administering Medications in School

Parents and guardians, please note the following information regarding administering medications to students while they are at school or while they are attending a school sponsored activity:

Schools need written permissions from both a health care provider and a parent in order to administer any prescription and/or over the counter (OTC) medications to students at school or during any school-sponsored activity.

If your child's health care provider decides he or she can carry and use diabetes, asthma or epinephrine auto-injector medication independently, and you as a parent wish your child to do so, then the health care provider and the parent must provide the school nurse with a written note stating that your child can do so safely.

All health care provider orders and parent consents must be renewed each school year, or when there is a change in medication. Medication consent forms can be obtained at the Elementary School and the Junior/Senior High School nurses' offices.

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Staying Safe Online

A message from the TES & JSHS Principals

Social media use and digital communication is a daily occurrence for many young people. This is no different at Tully Elementary School or at the Junior-Senior High School. Although most social media sites require users to be age 13 or older, many students who are younger than 13 are using sites like Facebook, Instagram, and Snapchat to communicate. Additionally, students of all ages have the ability with personal devices to instantly communicate through text message, instant message, and email.

There are many advantages to the use of social media and to these methods of instant communication, which is why they are so popular. There are, however, some potential serious problems that can develop when young people use social media and instatnt communication. One such problem is cyberbullying. Cyberbullying is bullying or harassment that takes place via text message, instant message, email, SnapChat, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc. Often it takes the form of a comment or a picture, which others can then see and comment on, in a way that is humiliating, hurtful or otherwise unpleasant for a victim. While cyberbullying was once mostly a concern with JSHS age students, it has now also become a concern with our elementary school students.

Additionally, the types and methods of cyber-bullying evolve and change over time. For example, one current social media trend that is very concerning is that of "digital self-harm". This is when children bully themselves online using an anonymous profile. A recent article published through Florida Atlantic University, by Gale-Galoustian, describes this behavior and its underlying causes. Researchers discovered that children will engage in this behavior for a number of reasons, specifically, "self-hate; attention seeking; depressive symptoms; feeling suicidal; to be funny; and to see if anyone would react."

At TES and at the JSHS, we provide students with information related to internet safety and appropriate use of social media. We also have disciplinary policies and practices in place to address bullying behavior, including cyberbullying. Parents and other adults can help with internet safety by monitoring children's use of social media and use of instant communication. Additionally, it is imperative that patents and other adults contact someone at the schools (a teacher, or a counselor, or a social worker, or an administrator) if you have any concerns about the online activities of your children or their friends. We are here to help!

Tully Central School District Nominating Petitions

Three terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2018. Each winner will be elected for three year terms from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021 at the annual school district election to be held on May 15, 2018

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. This nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, Tully Central School District Offices, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than 5:00 pm on April 16, 2018. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures.

Under the law a qualified voter is one who is entitled to vote at a school district election. To be entitled to vote a person must meet these three qualifications:

- A citizen of the United States
- At least 18 years of age
- A resident of the school district for a period of at least 30 days prior to the election.

Private Transportation Requests Due By April 1st

New York State Education Law Section 3635(2) requires that a written request be made to the Board of Education of a School District when transportation of a student to a non-public, private or parochial school is required. This written request must be made annually and received by the school district no later than April 1st for transportation for the next school year. Most non-public schools have a form available to make this request and can be contacted for assistance.
