**NYS Assessment Information**: A great deal of learning took place in March, not just with students, but also faculty. Teachers continued to work with coaches from BOCES in the areas of literacy and using data to inform instruction. On our March Superintendent's Conference Day, teachers focused on individual professional learning and also trained on responding to emergency situations using the Navigate Prepared platform. Primary age teachers attended a leadership meeting on Early Learning connected to the newest New York State Standards.

March's Positivity Project strengths were Love of Learning, Social Intelligence, and Fairness. In April, students will learn about the strengths of Humor, Appreciation of Beauty & Excellence, and Purpose. They will also learn to identify and appreciate the good in others. Parents or family members who wish to learn more about their own character strengths can take a free survey at viacharacter.org. According to this survey, fairness is my top character strength. Next school year, we hope to be able to provide more opportunities for parents to be involved with P2!

The week of March 23rd, students in grades 3 - 6 will complete their New York State ELA Assessments on their Chromebooks. The week of April 20th, these same students will sit for the state math assessment. Specific dates for each grade level are included below.

Each assessment is designed to be administered over two consecutive days. There is no time limit to complete any session of the test. Teachers have modeled their local assessments after the state assessments to reflect these types of questions so our students are comfortable with the design of these exams and the performance expectations.

Students will take both the ELA and Math assessments in the computer-based-testing format (CBT). The content tested is the same as the paper-based versions and we are helping students prepare for the experience by providing additional time during the school day to work with the Chromebooks and become familiar with the layout of the assessments. The tentative testing schedule will be as follows: (Please check the website for the most up-to-date information.)

Grades 3 & 4: ELA Assessment 8:00 a.m. on March 26 & 27; Math Assessment 8:00 a.m. on April 22 & 23

Grades 5 & 6: ELA Assessment 8:00 a.m. on March 24 & 25; Math Assessment 8:00 a.m. on April 20 & 21

Grades 7 & 8: ELA Assessment 8:00 a.m. on March 25 & 26; Math Assessment 8:00 a.m. on April 22 & 23

Make-Ups: ELA Assessment March 30 - April 3; Math Assessment April 24 - April 30

## **JSHS** Principal's Message

Teen mental health wellness is a very prominent topic in health care today. Schools across the nation have implemented required mental health standards that are typically taught in health classes, and Tully Junior Senior High School is no exception. In addition to learning about the standards, health teachers, along with counselors, work within their networks to share ideas and resources to best serve our students. Anxiety and depression are very common mental health issues for teens and giving them support and strategies is necessary for dealing with those issues. One of the first steps in realizing that children may need help is recognizing symptoms such as, but not limited to: changes in behavior, drop in grades, avoiding social outings, acting with aggression, and trouble sleeping. Parents can work with school counselors, pediatricians, or other agencies to assist students in employing strategies to work through anxiety and depression.

Students will have normal experiences that promote anxiety such as worrying about an upcoming test, disagreements with friends, etc. When they use alcohol, tobacco, or drugs, teens may be looking for unhealthy ways to cope with

anxiety and/or depression. It is important for families and school counselors to work together to help the students learn about healthy ways to deal with their emotions such as physical exercise, openly talking to parents and/or counselors, and eating healthy foods. There are local agencies that can assist families with counseling and other options such as Liberty Resources and ARISE. The local Tully PEACE, Inc. office is also a great resource in our community to connect families with agencies for many needs, including teen mental health.

If parents or students are concerned about mental health issues, they can seek assistance from Mrs. Newton and Mrs. Davin, school counselors, and Mr. Villhauer, school psychologist, by calling the Junior Senior High School at 315-696-6240.

#### **From the Superintendent**



On October 28, 2019, the Tully Community approved our 2022 Capital Improvement Project. This project is broken into two phases. Phase 1 calls for construction beginning in May of 2020 and ending in October of 2020. Plans for Phase 1 have already been approved by the New York State Education Department. The District has already begun the process of soliciting bids from contractors.

Items in Phase 1 include replacing a portion of the JSHS heating, air conditioning and ventilation system (HVAC), replacing the bleachers in the JSHS main gym, installing a generator at the Elementary School, and replacing some of the older sidewalks near both the JSHS and TES.

During the months of May and June, contractors will be working in the mechanical rooms at both the JSHS and TES. During the last two weeks in June, contractors will be removing the existing bleachers in the main gym at the JSHS. During the months of July and August, contractors will be installing new bleachers in the main gym at the JSHS, replacing some sidewalks near both school buildings, and installing the generator at TES. During the months of September and October, contractors will complete any outstanding punch list items.

District Administrators have been working closely with our architects and construction manager to ensure that any construction work will have minimal impact on our instructional program. As we get closer to May, we will be creating a 2022 Capital Project page on the District Website in order to keep the community informed. Additionally, as in the past, I will send out regular School Messenger notices to keep parents/guardians informed about ongoing construction on our school campus.

Regarding Phase 2 of the 2022 Capital Improvement Project, we are currently working on schematic designs. During Phase 2, we will be renovating several interior spaces in both buildings and constructing a concession stand adjacent to the football field. This concession stand will include public restrooms.

At the JSHS we will be renovating the locker rooms, the art classrooms, one of the agriculture rooms, the Guidance Office, the Nurse's Office, the Junior High Office, four student bathrooms, the auditorium, and converting the old computer labs into a Junior High Learning Commons. At TES, we will be renovating many of the older classrooms, the band and chorus rooms, the PE Office, the auditorium, and the records retention space. Additionally, if funds permit, we will renovate the business/district offices.

Once schematic designs have been completed, our architects will create architectural drawings. We anticipate these drawings will be completed by November of 2020. At that time we will submit these drawings to the New York State Education Department for review.

## Internet Safety Presented to Students

Because the internet has opened many doors and provided countless educational opportunities for children, they have become immersed in it; but going online without knowing some basic safety rules can also be dangerous. Inadvertent exposure to inappropriate material, cyberbullying, or enticement can happen to any child, at any time, and could have devastating effects. That is why on January 9, students in grades 5-8 attended a presentation on internet safety. The presentations were provided by the New York State Missing Persons Clearinghouse at the Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) and were designed to teach children and young teens the fundamentals of online safety. Alexa Benincasa and Bryan Billa conducted the assembly-style presentations at Tully. They focused on teaching safe and responsible skills, how to use those skills, and encouraged students to keep their parents and teachers informed about what they are doing online. Tips on how to be internet smart, avoiding risky behaviors, protecting their privacy and personal information, avoiding enticement, and cyberbullying were also covered. Many students found the information resourceful and helpful.



#### Private Transportation Requests Due by April 1st

NYS Education Law Section 3635(2) requires that a written request be made to the Board of Education of a School District when transportation of a student to a non-public, private or parochial school is required. This written request must be made annually and received by the school district no later than April 1st for transportation for the next school year. Most non-public schools have a form available to make this request and can be contacted for assistance. #### Nominating Petitions Available for Board of Education positions

Two terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2020. Each winner will be elected for three-year terms from July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2023 at the annual school district election to be held on May 19, 2020.

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. This nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 20, 2020. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence.

Under the law, a qualified voter is one who is entitled to vote at a school district election. To be entitled to vote a person must meet these three qualifications:

- A citizen of the United States.
- At least 18 years of age.
- A resident of the school district for a period of at least 30 days prior to the election.


