#### From The Desk of the Superintendent

Included in this issue of the Knight Insight is information regarding both our academic program and the proposed 2020-21 school budget. Regarding our 3-8 State Assessment results, it is a little difficult to interpret them, as the format, timing, and focus of these assessments continues to change from year to year. This aside, our 3-8 ELA and math assessment data do show that most of our students in grades 3-8 are making good academic progress from year to year.

Our high school Regents Exam results remain a good indicator of the strength of our overall academic program. Across the board, our high school students (along with our accelerated 8th graders) continue to demonstrate a much higher level of academic achievement than their peers across New York State. This can be seen at both the passing and mastery levels. Additionally, our graduation rate, including the percentage of our students earning an Advanced Regents Diploma, continues to be among the highest in the area.

Regents Exam results and graduation rates are exit outcomes, and as such confirm a high level academic achievement for our high school students. When used in conjunction with locally created K-8 assessments, these exit outcomes are also useful in identifying strengths of our academic program and areas where we seek to improve.

Regarding the proposed 2020-21 school budget, funds are included to support a new counseling position at the Elementary School and a new social worker position at the Junior/Senior High School. Given the stress and anxiety created by our current circumstances, we believe that next year it will be important to provide additional social and emotional support for our students and their families. Additionally, the proposed 2020-21 school budget supports all of our existing academic, athletic, and co-curricular student programs.

At this time we are projecting that there will be reductions to New York State School Aid during the 2020-21 school year. The District has sufficient reserves to offset potential reductions to New York State School Aid over the next 12 months; however, if these state aid reductions extend beyond the 2020-21 school year, we will need to look for other ways to balance the budget.

Stay safe and healthy, and I am looking forward to the time when our students, faculty, and staff are once again together on our school campus.

By absentee ballot only

#### **Governor Cuomo's Executive Order**

Annual school board election and budget vote is scheduled to take place on June 9, 2020. All voting will be done via absentee ballot.

Prior to May 26th, absentee ballots along with a postage-paid return envelope will be mailed to each registered voter in the District. Absentee ballots must be received back by 5:00 p.m. on June 9, 2020 in order to be counted. Voters wishing to return absentee ballots in person should call the District Office (315-696-6204) to schedule an appointment to do so.

Qualified voters who have not received an absentee ballot by June 1, 2020 should contact the District Clerk (Mary Fisher). She can be contacted by email or phone (mfisher@tullyschools.org or 315-696-6204).

Our annual Public Budget Hearing will take place on Tuesday, May 26, 2020, beginning at 6:00 p.m., immediately prior to the May 26, 2020 Board of Education Meeting. This Public Budget Hearing will be conducted virtually. There will be a link on the District Homepage allowing the public to view this hearing.

## **Tully Elementary Program Review**

Tully Elementary School offers a comprehensive educational program in grades PK-6 to meet the academic, social/emotional, and behavioral needs of students. The English Language Arts curriculum contains a combination of programs including Guided Reading, Fountas & Pinnell Classroom, EngageNY modules, Rebecca Sitton spelling, and Lucy Calkins' Units of Study. Several teachers received professional development on the science of reading at LETRS training. Math instruction is aligned with the EngageNY modules. In social studies, teachers are implementing the C3 Framework and state standards along with integrating inquiry-based units. Science instruction is aligned with the new New York State Science Learning Standards and in-depth study using curriculum materials from the Smithsonian. In addition to the core subjects of ELA, math, science, and social studies, students also receive instruction in art, computer, library, and music at least once per week and physical education every other school day. Students with special needs receive services as indicated on their Individualized Education Program (IEP) and we provide ELL services for students whose native language is not English.

The Positivity Project served as our primary character education program again this year, focusing on the idea that other people matter. Monthly school assemblies highlight the 24 character strengths learned in the classroom and fostered a sense of school pride and community. We continue to employ a "middle school" model for 5th and 6th grade, and all classes incorporate the tenets of Responsive Classroom. Our 1:1 technology device initiative was rolled out school-wide this fall. This ability to provide each student with a Chromebook was instrumental to implementing a successful remote instruction program as a result of the COVID-19 closure. Our daily What I Need Now (WINN) time is focused on meeting the academic needs of individual students and we also offer push-in and pull-out support services for students.

Our Activity Period takes place four days per week at the end of the academic day. In addition to making-up work and receiving academic support, this time is also an opportunity for students to take advantage of a number of clubs and co-curricular activities and experiences depending on their grade level. Students can participate in a grade 3/4 chorus, Jazz Band, NYSSMA, and All-County. We also provide an elementary drama experience for interested 5th and 6th graders. There is also an intramural program, art club, a makerspace club, and yearbook club. Character Council helps promote school spirit and community service through events like food drives, special clothing days, and the annual March Madness Hoop Shoot and June Flag Day Community Celebration.

## **Junior Senior High Program Review**

At Tully Junior Senior High School we offer a college and career-ready curriculum that provides students with the required courses for graduation along with many electives. Students can challenge themselves by taking Advanced Placement courses in English, United States history, world history, biology, statistics, and chemistry, as well as honors courses in English and social studies. Our 8th graders have the opportunity to take courses in living environment and algebra for high school credit. Several faculty members teach courses in pre-calculus, calculus, business and finance, Spanish, French, and English as part of our partnership with Onondaga Community College. In 2019, we began a partnership with Tomkins Cortland Community College to offer several math electives. We also have articulation agreements with SUNY Morrisville and SUNY Cobleskill for most of our agriculture courses. Students may choose to take elective courses including psychology, sociology, current events, and the US in the 1960s for students interested in a career in the social sciences, SAT preparation for students planning on attending college, and a culinary course that emphasizes the science behind nutrition and meal preparation. Support is provided to those in need through co-teach English in grades 7-10 and math in grades 7-9, Academic Intervention Services (AIS), and Special Education services. Each year the JSHS counselors host a college and career readiness day where we have numerous occupations represented along with over a dozen colleges from central, western, and eastern New York. Counselors also work with students throughout the year to set up career plans, plan academic programming, apply to colleges, and explore military and career opportunities.

At the junior high level, we help students transition from 6th to 7th grade through a series of activities including a "welcome day" in the spring and an orientation in August. Curriculum Night is held early in the school year for all Junior-Senior High School students and parents. A program review of our state assessment and Regents scores is presented followed by parents meeting with teachers to learn about course syllabi and classroom expectations. Our junior high students have a "flex" period that is tailored by the teachers to meet the needs and interests of individuals and small groups of students, or that can be used for enrichment and interdisciplinary learning experiences.

Tully JSHS offers 33 extra-curricular activities for our students. Our FFA expanded over the last several years to include a junior chapter for students in 7th and 8th grade. Our senior FFA chapter earned the honor of being the 2019 New York State Chapter of the Year. Students may also compete in 17 Varsity sports as well as Junior Varsity, Modified, and Junior High offerings.

## Frequently Asked Questions

#### Is the "tax cap" really 2%?

Current NYS law does not actually define the local "tax cap" as 2%. Instead, it defines a formula the local school districts must use to determine a local "tax cap". This year our local "tax cap" is 2.50%. There are actually eight variables in the "tax cap" formula. These variables include the following: the rate of inflation or 2% (whichever is lower), certain local capital expenditures, a portion of the increases in state-mandated pension costs, and a portion of certain legal costs. In some situations, the local "tax cap" can be above 2% and in other situations, the local "tax cap" can be a negative number.

## What if a school district decides to exceed the "tax cap"?

School budgets that exceed the local "tax levy limit" must be approved by a supermajority (more than 60%) of eligible voters. So, if our proposed budget reflected an increase above 2.50%, we would need a supermajority for it to be approved by voters. Since our budget stays within the local "tax levy limit," only a simple majority (more than 50%) of voter approval is required.

## What happens if the budget is not approved by voters?

If a proposed budget is defeated by voters, a school district has a couple of options: The school district could put the same budget up for a re-vote; The school district could decide to put a revised budget up for a vote; or, The school district could decide to adopt a contingent budget. If a proposed budget is defeated twice by voters, a school district must adopt a contingent budget. If a school adopts a contingent budget, some very specific items must be excluded, for example: funding for community use of the schools, certain types of specific salary increases, and new equipment purchases. Additionally, under our current "tax cap" legislation, a school district that adopts a contingent budget may not increase its current tax levy by any amount. This, in effect, translates into a zero percent tax increase.



## **Proposition I**

Shall the Board of Education of the Tully Central School District be authorized to expend the sum of Twenty One Million, Four Hundred Fifty Five Thousand, Five Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$21,455,530) as General Fund appropriations for the school year 2020-2021 and levy the necessary tax therefor?

#### **Proposition II** Library Tax

For the purpose of funding the Tully Free Library, shall the sum of One Hundred Ninety Eight Thousand, Two Hundred Fourteen Dollars (\$198,214) be raised by annual levy of a tax upon the taxable real property within the Tully Central School District?

#### **Voter Qualifications**

In order to vote you must be:

- A United States citizen
- At least 18 years of age
- A resident of the school district for at least 30 days preceding the vote

#### **BOE Elections**

Also before the voters will be to elect two (2) members of the Board of Education for three (3) year terms commencing July 1, 2020 and expiring on June 30, 2023.
