From The Desk of the Superintendent

Included in this issue of the Knight Insight is information about both our academic program and the proposed 2021-22 School Budget. Results from the 3-8 New York State Assessments and New York State Regents Exams are not included in this issue. Neither the 3-8 assessments nor the Regents Exams were administered in the spring of 2020. Regarding our 2021-22 academic program, we anticipate offering all of the same academic, athletic, and co-curricular programs as in the past.

The proposed 2021-22 School Budget supports all of our existing academic, athletic, and co-curricular student programs. Additionally, within the proposed 2021-22 School Budget, reserve funds are being included as a revenue source to offset costs related to faculty and staff retirements. Using reserve funds in this way allows us to direct more resources toward academic, athletic, and co-curricular programs for our students. We do believe this is a sustainable use of reserve funds.

The recently adopted New York State budget includes a 3% increase in Foundation Aid for Tully Schools. Going forward, we anticipate receiving additional federal aid, which will be used to offset costs associated with the COVID-19 Pandemic. As a result, we are able to propose a local tax levy increase of 1.7% for the 2021-22 school year. This increase is slightly below our local tax cap, which is 1.72%.

Beyond the 2021-22 school year, there are some indications that reduced economic activity in New York State may have a negative impact on future levels of state aid. If this is the case, in order to preserve student programs we may need to become more reliant on fund balance and reserves as a revenue source. Fortunately, sound fiscal planning has put us in a position to be able to do so if necessary.

During the 2020-21 school year, our faculty, staff, and parents have worked tirelessly to maintain a sense of normalcy for our students. We have been able to provide a combination of in-person and remote instruction with very few interruptions. Most of our co-curricular clubs and athletic teams have been active this year. Throughout the school year, we have consistently delivered breakfasts and lunches to our remote students. Our counselors and social workers have stayed connected with our in-person and our remote students. As of April 8th, we were able to pivot back to full-time in-person instruction for all of our families who wanted it. As I write this article, we are making plans for an almost normal spring sports season.

I am proud of how our school community has pulled together during the 2020-21 school year to support our students. Looking forward to the 2021-22 school year, I am hopeful that we will emerge from this pandemic stronger and more unified than ever before.

Tully Elementary Program

Tully Elementary School offers a comprehensive educational program in grades PK-6 to meet the academic, social/emotional, and behavioral needs of students. The English Language Arts curriculum contains a combination of programs, including Guided Reading, Fountas & Pinnell Classroom, EngageNY modules, and Lucy Calkins' Units of Study. Math instruction is aligned with the EngageNY modules. In Social Studies, teachers are implementing the C3 Framework and state standards along with integrating inquiry-based units. Science instruction is aligned with the new New York State Science Learning Standards and in-depth study using curriculum materials from the Smithsonian. In addition to the core subjects of ELA, Math, Science, and Social Studies, students also receive instruction in Art, Computer, Library, and Music at least once per week, and Physical Education every other school day. Students with special needs receive services as indicated on their Individualized Education Program (IEP) and we provide ELL services for students whose native language is not English.

The Positivity Project served as our primary character education program again this year, focusing on the idea that other people matter. Monthly school assemblies highlight the 24 character strengths learned in the classroom and fostered a sense of school pride and community. We continue to employ a "middle school" model for 5th and 6th grade, and all classes incorporate the tenets of Responsive Classroom. Each student has access to their own Chromebook which provides access to a wealth of information and Google Classrooms, allowing students to truly learn from anywhere.

Even though we could not provide an Activity Period this year, we still were able to offer a number of clubs and co-curricular activities and experiences depending on their grade level. Students participated in Jazz Band, NYSSMA, and All-County. We also provided an elementary drama experience for interested 5th and 6th graders along with a virtual 5/6 art club, a virtual makerspace club, and yearbook club. School spirit and community service were promoted through events like food drives, special clothing days, and the annual March Madness Hoop Shoot.

Junior Senior High Program

At Tully Junior Senior High School, we offer a college and career ready curriculum that provides students with the required courses for graduation along with many electives. Students can challenge themselves by taking Advanced Placement courses in United States History, Biology, Statistics and Chemistry as well as honors courses in English and Social Studies. Our 8th graders have the opportunity to take courses in Living Environment and Algebra for high school credit. Several faculty members teach courses in Pre-Calculus, Calculus, Business and Finance, Spanish, French, and English as part of our partnership with Onondaga Community College. Several math electives are offered through Tompkins Cortland Community College. We also have articulation agreements with SUNY Morrisville and SUNY Cobleskill for most of our agriculture courses. Students may choose to take elective courses including Psychology and Sociology for students interested in a career in the social sciences, SAT preparation for students planning on attending college, and a culinary course that emphasizes the science behind nutrition and meal preparation. Support is provided to those in need through Co-teach English in grades 7-10 and Math in grades 7-9, Academic Intervention Services (AIS) and Special Education. Each year, the JSHS counselors host a college and career readiness day where we have numerous occupations represented along with over a dozen colleges from central, western, and eastern New York.

At the junior high level, we help students transition from grade 6 to 7 through a series of activities including a "Welcome Day" in the spring and an orientation in August. Curriculum Night is held early in the school year for all Junior-Senior High School students and parents. A program review of our state assessment and Regents scores is presented followed by parents meeting with teachers to learn about course syllabi and classroom expectations. Our junior high students have a "flex" period that is tailored by the teachers to meet the needs and interests of individuals and small groups of students, or that can be used for enrichment and interdisciplinary learning experiences. We are hopeful to get back to these "normal" activities in the upcoming school year.

Tully JSHS offers 33 extra-curricular activities with excellent student participation. Students may also compete in 17 Varsity sports along with numerous Junior Varsity, Modified, and Junior High offerings. This year's addition of a school social worker has been immensely helpful. Over 100 students per month are seen by the social worker to check in on students' social/emotional health.

Voter Qualifications

In order to vote you must be:

- A United States citizen
- At least 18 years of age
- A resident of the school district for at least 30 days preceding the vote

Proposition I

Shall the Board of Education of the Tully Central School District be authorized to expend the sum of Twenty One Million, Eight Hundred Ninety-Three Thousand, Thirty-Seven Dollars (\$21,893,037) as General Fund appropriations for the school year 2021-2022 and levy the necessary tax therefor?

Proposition II - Library Tax

For the purpose of funding the Tully Free Library, shall the sum of Two Hundred Eight Thousand, One Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (\$208,125) be raised by annual levy of a tax upon the taxable real property within the Tully Central School District?

BOE Elections

Also before the voters will be to elect three (3) members of the Board of Education for three (3) year terms commencing July 1, 2021 and expiring on June 30, 2024. Nominating petitions were due into the district clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 19, 2021. Candidate bios and pictures may be posted on the school website.

Note that Tully Free Library (TFL) will be holding a Meet-the-Candidates Night on Tuesday, May 4 at 7 p.m. TFL places a notice on their outdoor sign in front of the building. You should contact TFL to confirm the date.

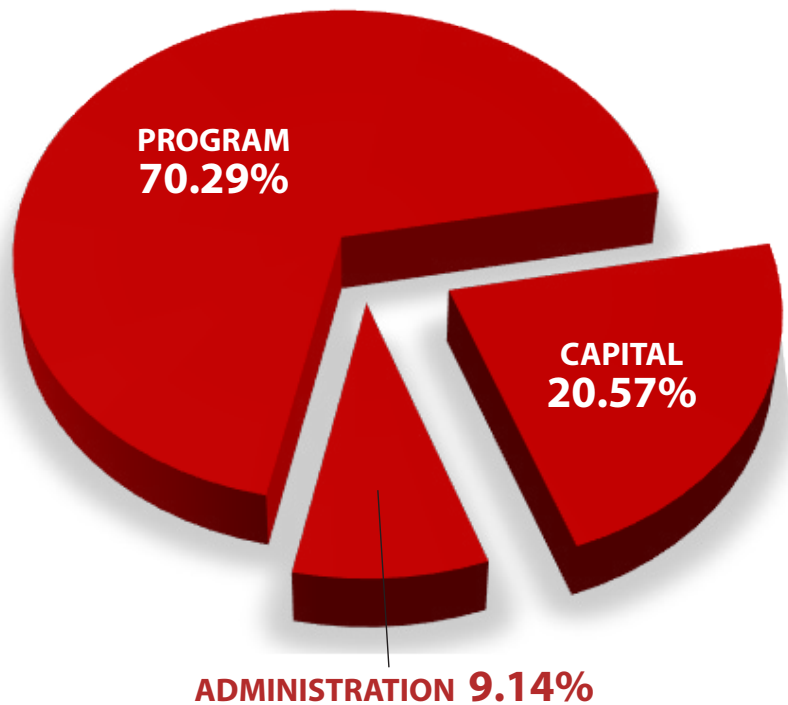

Frequently Asked Questions

Is the "tax cap" really 2%? Current NYS law does not actually define the local "tax cap" as 2%. Instead, it defines a formula the local school districts must use to determine a local "tax cap." This year our local tax cap is 1.72%. There are actually eight variables in the "tax cap" formula. These variables include the following: the rate of inflation or 2% (whichever is lower), certain local capital expenditures, a portion of the increases in state-mandated pension costs, and a portion of certain legal costs. In some situations, the local "tax cap" can be above 2% and in other situations, the local tax cap can be a negative number.

What if a school district decides to exceed the "tax cap"? School budgets that exceed the local "tax levy limit" must be approved by a super majority (more than 60%) of eligible voters. So, if our proposed budget reflected an increase above 1.72%, we would need a supermajority for it to be approved by voters. Since our budget stays within the local "tax levy limit," only a simple majority (more than 50%) of voter approval is required.

What happens if the budget is not approved by voters? If a proposed budget is defeated by voters, a school district has a couple of options: The school district could put the same budget up for a re-vote; the school district could decide to put a revised budget up for a vote; or, a school district could decide to adopt a contingent budget. If a proposed budget is defeated twice by voters, a school district must adopt a contingent budget. If a school adopts a contingent budget, some very specific items must be excluded, for example: funding for community use of the schools, certain types of specific salary increases, and new equipment purchases. Additionally, under our current "tax cap" legislation, a school district that adopts a contingent budget may not increase its current tax levy by any amount. This, in effect, translates into a zero percent tax increase.

Tully Elementary held the annual March Madness Hoop Shoot event on March 26th. The Hoop Shoot is a highly anticipated event where the entire school packs into the gymnasium and cheers on the students and teachers competing in a free throw shooting contest. Due to this year's rules/regulations, the event had some minor changes that were made in order to carry on the tradition. During special areas, each grade level was able to have their own individual Hoop Shoot contest. The students socially distanced in the stands, cheered on their classmates, and enjoyed the event with their peers. We had some very impressive showings from the charity stripe, and the future looks bright for the basketball programs! As always, we finished each contest with the half-court shot taken by the physical education teachers and Mr. Kupiec! Although the percentages were not very good, each teacher was able to make at least one half-court shot throughout the day. It may have been different not having the entire school there, but this year's Hoop Shoot was a success and we cannot wait to do it again next year!

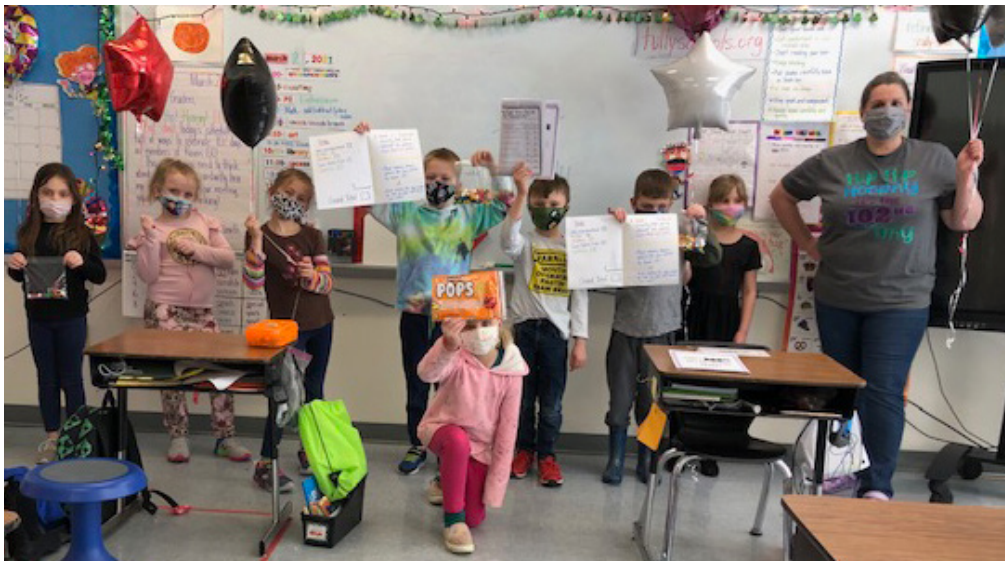

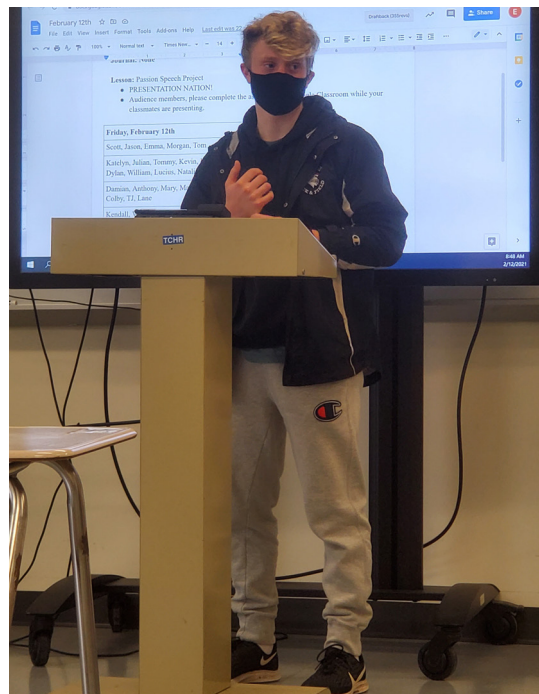
Academic Decathlon Scores Big

Tatyana Klochko, Airelle Ringhiser, Annie Coppola, and Moira McAninch used their skills and knowledge to win the team 3rd place overall. Individually, in the Honors Division, Klochko won a Gold medal in Math and Science, a Silver medal in Art, Literature, and Social Sciences, and a Bronze medal in Economics. McAninch won a Gold medal in Economics, Literature, Music, and Social Sciences, a Silver medal in Science, and a Bronze medal in Essay and Art. In the Varsity Division, Coppola won a Gold medal in Literature and Science, a Silver medal in Economics, and a Bronze medal in Art, Music, and Social Sciences. Speaking of...

11th grade English classes have been working through a rhetoric unit where they've studied different speakers and well-written speeches. They looked at different ways to affect their audience in terms of using ethos, pathos, and logos (and other rhetorical devices). They then chose subtopics that they are passionate about relating to larger umbrella topics of business, education, athletics, technology, and the environment. After researching and creating a speech to captivate and even motivate their audience, students then presented their findings with an allowance of between 2 minutes and 45 seconds to 3 minutes.
