## Our Youngest Learn Bus Safety



Our youngest students at TES enjoyed a sunny day while learning bus safety. Mrs. Katie Murphy, Tully Bus Dispatcher, spoke to the kids about seat belts, how to safely enter and exit the bus, evacuation procedures, and staying seated while the bus is in motion. Students practiced these important items and got to ask questions. Parents are encouraged to talk with their children about these important safety procedures as well.

## Science in Action



The science classes at the JSHS have been in full swing right from the beginning, helping students see science in action. Mrs. Tucker's classes, both the seventh grade and seniors, didn't waste any time jumping into the experiment portion of class.

Seventh graders got together in groups to grow plants, but not just any ordinary plants. Students had to choose a liquid besides water to grow their plants: caffeinated products, energy drinks, green tea with/out sugar, lemonade, etc. In addition, they had to decide how much to "water" their plant. Each group was given a control plant that would take the same amount of water each day as their experimental plant with the other liquid. Then they compared their plants. What an interesting experiment watching plants thrive (or not) under different conditions!

The seniors worked with owl pellets, dissecting them to identify what owls eat and how their food is digested. Some found enough bones to form a rodent skeleton such as a shrew, mouse, or mole. If they found a skull, they tried to identify which one it was. Others found intact feathers of a smaller bird.

No matter what they found, they were intrigued to see this science in action!

## PreK/K Registration

This year, we are starting our Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten Registration process earlier to better coincide with the budget planning process. If you have not already done so, please register your child(ren) online at <http://www.tullyschools.org>.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, children must be district residents and turn 4 years of age, but not yet reach age 5, by December 1, 2022. For the 2022-2023 school year, Tully Elementary School is able to accommodate a maximum of 54 students in pre-kindergarten. If more than 54 students have been registered for pre-kindergarten by January 31, 2022, the District will need to conduct a lottery to determine enrollment and organize a waiting list. Please note that Pre-K is a full-day program and we cannot provide school bus transportation until a child is 4 years old.

To enter kindergarten, children must be 5 years of age by December 1, 2022. Unlike pre-kindergarten, there is no limit on the number of district-resident kindergarten students who can be enrolled at Tully Elementary.

Information about the screening process for both grade levels will be mailed out to enrolled students in the spring. Please don't hesitate to contact the elementary office at 696-6213 if you have specific questions about the registration or screening process.

### Fall Athletics Recap

Even though some Covid restrictions remain, the overall feel and excitement of interscholastic athletics has returned! Varsity Girls Soccer qualified for the Sectional tournament and won their first round game against Sandy Creek, 4-0. They played against Watertown IHC in the next round, which brought their injury marred season to a conclusion. The Tully Varsity Boys Soccer team took a very young team into the Sectional tournament. Varsity Football (Southern Hills Storm) finished their regular season play with a 4-2 record. The fall cheerleaders had a great season working on the sidelines of the boys' football games. The girls were enthusiastic, well-choreographed, and supportive of the boys all season! Boys Varsity Golf had several athletes qualify for the Fall Sectional Tournament at Beaver Meadows CC in October. The top finisher was senior Ryan Shute, who fired a 79 in the sectional match and will next compete in May 2022 at the State Qualifier at Colgate University. Our boys' Cross Country teams had a very successful season, finishing in 1st place in the OHSL Patriot League, winning the OHSL League Meet, and being one of the top seeded teams heading into the Class D Sectional race in November. As we go through the upcoming budget development process, there are a number of opportunities for members of the public to share ideas. Specifically, at the Board of Education meetings listed above there will be an opportunity for members of the public to share comments on the budget. Additionally, on May 9th, we will be holding our Annual Budget Hearing, during which members of the public may ask questions and share comments about the proposed 2022-23 school budget. This Budget Hearing will take place in the JSHS, beginning at 6:00 p.m., prior to the start of the May 9th BOE meeting.

Additionally, as we go through the budget development process, there are a number of opportunities for building administrators, faculty, and staff to help clarify budgetary needs. There are two goals in bringing building administrators, faculty, and staff into the budget development process. First, doing so helps us to identify ways to improve upon and expand learning opportunities for our students. Second, doing so helps everyone develop a more common understanding of the financial constraints we face as a public school. If we are effective on both of these fronts, we should be able to identify areas for improvement and cost saving measures.

Please note that in addition to discussions about our general fund budget, the process listed above will include discussions regarding our use of federal stimulus funding, commonly referred to as ESSER funding.
