Below are some things you should know:

School Wide Theme

- ◆ "Oh, The Places We'll Go" will be our building theme
- Our hallway signs will be referenced/focused upon throughout the year
- We'll share the places students travel throughout our curriculum

Morning Arrival:

- ◆ Our morning entry bell rings at 7:50 AM all children enter at this time from buses or walking
- ◆ All children need to be in their homeroom ready to learn before 8:05AM
- Breakfast students enter the building and go directly to the cafeteria
- Children will use different doors to enter/exit the building based on grade level
- ◆ We've labeled the doors with numbers:
 - 1. Walkers: (all grade levels) enter/exit through the State Street doors into our lobby
 - **2.** K-2 students: enter/exit through the Breezeway doors
 - **3.** 3-4 students: enter/exit through the Preble wing doors (closest to the track)
 - **4.** 5-6 students: enter/exit through the Main entrance doors

Afternoon Dismissal:

- Our afternoon dismissal bell rings at 2:35 PM
- Activity period begins the first full week of school (every day except Tuesday)
- ◆ Activity period ends at 3:15 PM

Fifth and Sixth grade:

- ◆ We'll call these grades our middle school this year
- ◆ They'll have identical schedules
- ◆ Teachers are departmentalized

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CLOSING REMARKS



This September we are welcoming a number of new students at both of our schools. Some of these students are our new kindergarteners, who were able to visit their classrooms during the last week of the summer. Others are students who have moved into the community over the summer, and who have been in from time to time to tour the schools prior to the first day. Additionally, we have a new cohort of 7th grade students starting at the Junior/Senior High School. Many of these students were at our recent 7th grade orientation, where they had the opportunity to walk through their schedules, and to become more familiar with the Junior/Senior High School. We are also welcoming several new faculty and staff members to our school community this year. Our new teachers were in the buildings a couple of weeks ago for a new teacher orientation, and all of our new employees were in during the last week of the summer for some staff development. I would like to extend a warm welcome to all of our new students, parents, faculty, and staff.

September is also a time for reflecting back with a critical eye on the previous school year. We typically set some time aside during the month of September to review our 3-8 NYS

Assessment results, and our Regents Exam results, as a means of conducting a program evaluation. While these are imperfect measures, it is still possible to use NYS Assessment and Regents Exam results as a means of identifying areas of program strength and areas for improvement. Our students' 3-8 Assessment results seem to have improved slightly year over year, in both ELA and math, but given our 25% opt-out rate from the spring of 2015, these results are a little difficult to interpret. Regardless of the opt-outs, it does seem that the work we have done to align our K-8 program is leading to some improved academic results. In looking at our Regents Exam results, it is clear that our high school students met with tremendous academic success during the 2014-15 school year, as our students' Regents Exam scores were again among the top third in the area.
