
Athletic Participation

Principal's Message



The first semester is in the rearview mirror and we are speeding towards the spring and graduation! Seniors should be focused on graduation and finishing their last semester at Tully. Also, this is an important time for these students to plan for what comes next after graduation. We encourage our seniors to meet with counselors and discuss work plans, military opportunities, or the final steps in the college process. Currently, the graduation committee, composed of student leaders, volunteers, and staff members, is hard at work planning all of the details for the Class of 2025 commencement ceremony which will occur on Friday, June 20th.

For the rest of our student body, they should have their attention on both their academics and extracurricular activities. With the exception of Winter Break, from February 17th until February 21st, and the Superintendent's Conference day on March 31st, we are in session every day until the end of the third marking period on April 4th. Now is a

wonderful time when every student has the opportunity to make great academic and extracurricular gains.

The second semester is the time when students sit down with their counselors and begin making their schedules for next year. The Tully Junior-Senior High School Counseling and Career Center will begin this process and register students for classes for the 2025- 2026 school year. This past January, we held our first Electives Fair. During the Electives Fair, students were able to see displays created by the elective teachers to learn more about the course and see first hand the electives that interest them. Mrs. Newton is the counselor for students with last names that begin with A-K and Mrs. Davin is the counselor for students with last names that begin with L-Z. They will be holding presentations on transitioning to high school for eighth grade students and their parents at a later date. Also, eleventh grade students and their parents will meet individually with the counselors to work on schedules and discuss post graduation plans.

Model UN

Tully's Model United Nations participated in the 42nd annual CNYMUN event at Syracuse University, which is a two-day Harvard style Model United Nations conference. This conference hosts over 750 students bringing schools from all over CNY. Over the course of the two days, delegates solve global issues through debate. This year, our students served as ambassadors for Hungary, Venezuela, Ghana, as well as a US representative in labor.

Senior Lucy Wright took on the role of Google CEO Kent Walker in a US labor summit. While not technically a UN committee, Model UN sometimes does specialized simulations where students can still tackle issues outside the UN's limited executive authority.

Senior Gavin Burrell was the Hungarian ambassador to the UN in the committee for the International

Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA). The goal of the IAEA is to limit the production and spread of nuclear arms throughout the world. As ambassador for Hungary, Gavin had strategic interests in nuclear arms proliferation left over from the Cold War.

Seniors Isaac Stoogenke and Wes Chambala were ambassadors to Hungary and Ghana, respectively, in the commission on crime prevention and criminal justice. Their topics were on limiting the illegal trafficking of firearms and weapons, and the efficacy of capital punishment as a means of crime prevention.

Seniors Cameron Morey and Quinzi Williams were "Double Delegates" in their committee, the Organization of American States (OAS). This committee is similar to the EU or African Union in that its goal is to improve life and encourage commerce and economic opportunity among the Americas (North, Central, and South). As a double delegation, they act as a "team." While one person is speaking, the other person should be taking notes and

preparing responses from other delegates. Their topics were on addressing inhumane labor practices and combating the influence of drug cartels on regional governments.

What a great way for our students to develop invaluable debate and speaking skills while solving the world's most prevalent issues!

With several parent volunteers in tow, the seventh graders worked together with the residents to make over forty pies for their holiday festivities. Private Transportation Requests Due by April 1st

NYS Education Law Section 3635(2) requires that a written request be made to the Board of Education of a School District when transportation of a student to a non-public, private, or parochial school is required. This written request must be made annually and received by the school district no later than April 1st for transportation for the next school year. Most non-public schools have a form available to make this request and can be contacted for assistance. Please have these written requests sent to Attn: Jamie Wortley, Tully Central School District, Business Office, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than April 1, 2025.

From Your School Resource Officers

- Due to the time of year, please be aware of the daily temperature and dress accordingly.
- Even if snow is not present, be aware that roadways, parking lots, and sidewalks may still be icy.
- Drivers on campus need to make sure that ALL windows are clear of snow and ice to see clearly. Driving with snow or ice blocking your view is very dangerous and could be considered reckless.
- The maximum speed limit on campus is 15 mph unless roadway conditions dictate slower speeds. New York State's Vehicle and Traffic Law (VTL) § 1180(a) defines imprudent speed as driving a vehicle at a speed that is not reasonable or prudent under the current conditions.
- Elementary parents should make every effort to unload/ load children from the passenger side of the vehicle when dropping off and picking up. This may require you to adjust seating with boosters/car seats/etc. Also, please say your good-byes at the vehicle do not leave your vehicle unattended to walk children to the door at any time.

School District Nominating Petitions Available for Board of Education Positions

Two terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2025. Each winner will be elected for three-year terms from July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2028 at the annual school district election to be held on May 20, 2025.

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. The nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, Tully CSD, District Office, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 21, 2025. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures.

General eligibility requirements for school board candidates under the law are:

- a citizen of the United States
- · at least eighteen years of age
- a qualified voter in the school district

As we embark on this new year together, I want to take a moment to address some important topics and upcoming opportunities that directly impact our students, staff, and families.

Regionalization Conversations

The New York State Education
Department is initiating conversations around regionalization, a process aimed at ensuring

equitable access to opportunities for all students across districts. While the term may sound complex, it simply means exploring ways to collaborate with neighboring districts to share resources and expand opportunities for students.

For Tully, this could mean continuing to provide the robust programs we are proud of, while also exploring what neighboring districts offer that we could take advantage of to enhance student experiences. Our focus remains on ensuring all students have access to the tools and resources they need to succeed, and regionalization conversations are just another way to strengthen that commitment. We will keep you informed as these discussions progress and ensure that our district's priorities and values are always at the forefront.

Superintendent's Conference Day: Focusing on Student Safety

Our final Superintendent's Conference Day for the year will take place at the end of March and will focus on a critically important topic: suicide prevention. In the morning, our staff will join a countywide collaborative workshop through Onondaga, Cortland, and Madison counties. This training underscores our shared goal of ensuring that all students feel safe, supported, and valued in our schools.

This initiative reflects our ongoing commitment to the health and well-being of our students. By equipping our staff with the tools and resources to recognize and respond to mental health concerns, we are working together to foster a safe and nurturing environment for every child.
