Culture Corner: PERU



Did you know that almost three-fourths of the world's alpacas live in Peru and are used as pack animals (a domesticated animal that carries goods on its back)? Other creatures that live in Peru are anacondas, deadly snakes, electric eels, giant otters, piranha, and river dolphins. This is due to the fact that the Amazon Rainforest covers almost half of the country and that the Amazon River begins there.

While Peruvians are used to being cautious around deadly waters, they also use bodies of water to their benefit. Ancient Peruvians were among some of the first surfers, and today, there are some who create their homes on Lake Titicaca. Using reeds of indigenous plants, people make floating islands, houses, and even boats on this lake. Lake Titicaca is truly a place of livelihood. Wild potatoes of all different shapes and colors were discovered there long ago, making it the birthplace of the potato. With over four thousand varieties to choose from, Peruvians have many colorful dishes made from potatoes. From blue and yellow to pink and purple, the potatoes are not the only thing that is colorful in Peru.

A rainbow colored mountain was discovered a little over ten years ago when the climate began to change and the snow began to melt off the mountains. It is now known as the Mountain of Seven Colors. Beautiful colors such as gold, maroon, turquoise, and lavender can be seen by those who hike up far enough. Private Transportation Requests Due By April 1

NYS Education Law Section 3635(2) requires that a written request be made to the Board of Education of a School District when transportation of a student to a non-public, private, or parochial school is required. This written request must be made annually and received by the school district no later than April 1st for transportation for the next school year. Most non-public schools have a form available to make this request and can be contacted for assistance. Please have these written requests sent to Attn: Jamie Wortley, Tully Central School District, Business Office, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than April 1, 2026.

From Your SROs

Due to the time of year, please be aware of the daily temperature and dress accordingly. Even if snow is not present, be aware that roadways, parking lots, and sidewalks may still be icy.

Drivers on campus need to make sure that ALL windows are clear of snow and ice to see clearly. Driving with snow or ice blocking your view is very dangerous and could be considered reckless. The maximum speed limit on campus is 15 mph unless roadway conditions dictate slower speeds. New York State's Vehicle and Traffic Law (VTL) § 1180(a) defines imprudent speed as driving a vehicle at a speed that is not reasonable or prudent under the current conditions.

Elementary parents should make every effort to unload/load children from the passenger side of the vehicle when dropping off and picking up. This may require you to adjust seating with boosters/car seats/etc. Also, please say your good-byes at the vehicle – do not leave your vehicle unattended to walk children to the door at any time.

Nominating Petitions Available for Board of Education Seats

Two terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2026. Each winner will be elected for three-year terms from July 1, 2026 through June 30, 2029 at the annual school district election to be held on May 19, 2026.

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. The nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, Tully CSD, District Office, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 20, 2026.

Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state their residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures.

General eligibility requirements for school board candidates under the law are: a citizen of the United States, at least eighteen years of age, and a qualified voter in the school district.

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
