## PreK/K Registration

Tully Central School is starting the Pre-Kinder-garten and Kindergarten Registration process for the 2026-2027 school year. If you have not already done so, please register your child(ren) online at <http://www.tullyschools.org>.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, children must be district residents and turn four years of age, but not yet reach age five, by December 1, 2026. Eligibility applies to students born between December 2, 2021 and December 1, 2022. For the 2026-2027 school year, Tully Elementary School is able to accommodate a maximum of thirty-six (36) students in pre-kindergarten. If more than thirty-six students have been registered for pre-kindergarten by January 31, 2026, the District will need to conduct a lottery to determine enrollment and organize a waiting list. Please note that Pre-K is a five-days-a-week, full-day program (8:00 - 2:30) and the District does not provide school bus transportation until a child is four years old.

To enter kindergarten, children must be at least five years of age and no older than six years of age by December 1, 2026. Unlike pre-kindergarten, there is no limit on the number of district-resident kindergarten students who can be enrolled at Tully Elementary. Students who are already enrolled in our Pre-K program do not need to register again for kindergarten; those students are automatically enrolled in kindergarten.

Information about the screening process for both grade levels will be mailed out to enrolled students in the spring. Please don't hesitate to contact the elementary office at 315-696-6213 if you have specific questions about the registration or screening process.

## Principal's Message



Happy 2026! We wish all of our families a happy and healthy new year! We are now in the home stretch of the first semester, with the second marking period ending on Friday, January 23rd. As always, we encourage all of our students to finish their semester-long courses strong and begin preparing for midterms and finals. Hopefully, students continue to take advantage of the direct academic support offered by all our teachers during Activity Period each day after school, except on Tuesdays.

Beginning this month, students in the Junior-Senior High School will begin working on their schedules for next year with their counselors. Decisions on courses for the next year need to be made for each student based on their current interests, future goals, and their aspirations following high school. Based on each student's interests, goals, and aspirations, it is essential that every student selects courses that align with their individual academic journey. While all students take courses and electives that enable them to meet graduation requirements, they will also have the opportunity to take coursework at an increased level of rigor throughout their high school career. We encourage families to have extended conversations regarding what courses are most beneficial for their student(s). Colleges will evaluate a student's transcript and look at the course rigor and their performance in those courses.

When students meet with their counselors, teacher recommendations are reviewed to facilitate conversations as we build next year's schedule for each student. Students who participate in honors, accelerated, Advanced Placement (AP), and college courses will be required to complete more work independently; engage in a higher level of critical thinking and problem solving; and be willing to write not only more frequently, but also longer pieces in styles that are new and/or unfamiliar. Depending on the course, there may be additional requirements such as labs, research projects, standardized tests, and lengthy writing assignments. Colleges offering courses at our school may require their own prerequisites and/or testing requirements that are beyond our control.

School counselors work hard to communicate course selections with students and their parents through meetings, classroom presentations, or having parents sign off on course selections. Counselors are always happy to meet with parents at any time. Those appointments can be arranged by contacting the Counseling and Career Center at 315-696-6235.

What great real-world experience for our agriculture students!


## Art with the SRO

## From the Superintendent



Happy New Year!

I would like to thank the school community for supporting the 24.5 million dollar Capital Project on December 11. The weather was challenging but 109 people voted in person that day which is greatly appreciated. Before I arrived in July, the team had the 'bones' of the planning complete and did an excellent job refining the scope to get the infrastructure where it needs to be.

This project will pay dividends into the long term future for Tully Schools.

Although we had our last meeting for Strategic Planning cancelled due to weather, our three Action Teams have drafted SMART goals and are in a position to present to the Board of Education this month. The team at BOCES has drafted a document that is currently being evaluated by all members of the Strategic Planning Team and we are confident that the next superintendent will also have some influence on the final draft.

Speaking of weather, it is always unpredictable during the late fall through early spring. With almost 70 square miles, some parts of the district may have roads worthy of travel while others may not. As you are aware, there are some challenging hills to be negotiated and our local road crews from the state, county, towns, and villages do great work to keep them clear. When weather may be a factor on school opening on time, delaying, or the rare closure, local superintendents are in frequent contact with each other. I also check the weather on local news, the National Weather Service, and check with local towns and Tully Directors of Transportation and Maintenance. If I determine that we can get students safely to school and then home, school remains open. The efficiency of the plows and salting, the quality of our buses and our drivers, and the fact that we serve approximately 800 meals each day we are in school, always has me leaning towards an on-time opening.

As of this writing, the search for the next superintendent is wrapping up and I am expecting January will be my last month as interim superintendent. I have greatly enjoyed my time working with the staff, connecting with the students, and gaining a different perspective of the school district. The students are a special group and it is clear they have been well parented.



### Culture Corner: ENGLAND


