Welcome to the end of the 2024-2025 school year! It has been a great year and I know the students are looking forward to a long, relaxing summer. Between the outdoor time, please encourage students to spend some time reading each day; it will really help them keep their skills up. This month concludes my ninth year here at Tully Elementary. As has become my custom, here is my yearbook message to the students which summarizes some of the highlights of the year: In addition to all the classroom learning, the 2024-2025 school year was full of sights that students will remember. There were the usual events like concerts, the musical, REV Theatre visits, and the Halloween and PK puppy parades, as well as field trips to the Syracuse Mets, Albany, Lime Hollow, Wonderworks, and The Wild.

The Tully Physical Education Department has some exciting news regarding a new unit coming to students in grades 5-12 next year. In recent months, our PE teachers took a field trip to OCS and participated in a workshop to become NASP (National Archery in Schools Program) certified. There they learned about safe range setup and range safety, safety orientation using archery equipment and teaching a new archer, determining eye dominance, how to teach and implement safety protocols, and how to properly care for the equipment. Because the NASP curriculum was designed with safety in mind and focuses on the development of the proper process over results, it made the training indepth regarding keeping our students safe while they pick up new skills. After the training, our district purchased the needed equipment and Mr. Tracy's Design class made quivers to hold the arrows. Students will be using Genesis compound bows during this unit which some of our students are familiar with. With several avid archers on campus, some participating in local leagues, students are excited to delve into this unit. In addition, with many NASP certified schools in our area, student-driven archery clubs are becoming widespread. NASP holds a state tournament in Syracuse that has upwards of 700 students competing each year. There is a lot of room for development of this program and all we have to say is, "Move over, Katniss Everdeen!" Special thanks goes to OCS for hosting this training!
