Mr. Keefe and Mrs. Fowler-Conner grouped the students into teams and gave them different types of building challenges. The youngest accepted the challenge of building skyscrapers out of Mega Bloks while the oldest built various working devices out of K'Nex. Students in between built marble mazes of all different difficulty levels out of Legos. These challenges encouraged students to be creative while collaborating with their team. They also provided our kinesthetic learners to shine. Whatever the challenge, the students accepted it with enthusiasm. All students visit the Maker Lab throughout the year as a component of the library program, so they will all be met with a fun but challenging activity!

4th Graders See the Benefit of Helmets



Fourth graders recently learned the importance of wearing a helmet while riding a bike by experimenting with eggs. Students were given items such as cups, cotton balls, packing peanuts, pipe cleaners, rubber bands, and tape to build a protective casing for an egg, aka a helmet, for a future egg drop. They used a plastic egg during the trial phase to make sure their real egg would fit into the casing.

Mrs. Baritell watched the students take ownership of their egg and become nervous

during the actual egg drop. While several eggs broke or even popped out of their casing, many were successful and all were prideful of their efforts to keep their egg heads safe.

The fourth graders learned that a certain amount of padding was needed to keep their heads safe, how things slow down in a collision, and about the friction that helps do so.

At Tully Junior-Senior High School, we offer a college and career ready curriculum that provides students with the required courses for graduation and many electives. Students can challenge themselves by taking Advanced Placement courses in United States History, Biology, and Chemistry, as well as honors courses in English and Social Studies. Our 8th graders have the opportunity to take accelerated courses in Living Environment and Algebra for high school credit. Several faculty members teach courses in Pre-Calculus, Business and Finance, Spanish, and English as part of our partnership with Onondaga Community College. We also have articulation agreements with SUNY Morrisville and SUNY Cobleskill for most of our agriculture courses. In order to provide our students with the best opportunities possible, new courses are planned in English and Social Studies for this upcoming year. Support is provided to those in need through Academic Intervention Services (AIS) and Special Education. We also offer distance learning courses through partnerships with BOCES.

Students transition from the elementary school to 7th grade through a series of activities including an individual annual review with a junior high counselor, a "Welcome Day" in the spring, and an orientation in August. Early in the school year, we host a curriculum night when parents can learn about courses and classroom expectations. Our junior high program includes flex classes that offer opportunities for enrichment, support, and project-based learning activities. In 7th and 8th grade, students take a variety of coursework in both career technical education and the fine arts in addition to their core curriculum, offering the opportunity to have an understanding of the future elective options available in those subject areas. Our school counseling program includes career education and exploration, academic review and support, classroom instruction, and individual counseling. Additionally, the junior high counselor provides social emotional learning and prevention education through the Second Step Education Program for all junior high students. We also have a school social worker available for students at all grade levels to support their mental health and wellness.

Tully JSHS offers 33 extra-curricular activities for our students to participate in including new official clubs, the Genders and Sexualities Alliance (GSA) and the Community Wide Dialogue club (CWD). We also are happy to offer 21 Varsity Sports with many additional athletic opportunities at the Junior Varsity, Modified, and junior high levels. At the Junior-Senior High School, we are proud to report that we have an 87% participation rate within the student body this year! At least 87% of our students participate in at least one extracurricular activity or sport!

Nominating Petitions Available for Board of Education Positions

Two terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2022. Each winner will be elected for three year terms from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2025 at the annual school district election to be held on May 17, 2022.

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. This nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, Tully Central School District Offices, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 18, 2022. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures.

Under the law a qualified voter is one who is entitled to vote at a school district election. To be entitled to vote a person must meet these three qualifications:

- A citizen of the United States.
- At least 18 years of age.
- A resident of the school district for a period of at least 30 days prior to the election.

At the beginning of March, the mask mandate went away and masks become optional in our school buildings. Some members of our school community continue to wear masks and we are continuing to implement some public health measures.
