Fourth Graders Take Learning on the Road



If you've ever had a fourth grader, there is no doubt you've heard about the many fun field trips they take, including the infamous "Albany Trip." Many students come into fourth grade already anticipating this big trip! But why take these trips and why fourth graders?

The fourth grade Social Studies curriculum is all about New York State. Students learn all about the Haudenosaunee, colonial times, immigration, industrialization, westward expansion with the Erie Canal, and New York State Government throughout the fourth-grade year. Bringing this learning to life is the main reason that our fourth graders take field trips, and this year they took the following three very important field trips.

Our state's capital, Albany, has so much to offer our students that connects to their learning throughout the year. Students were able to see their own state assemblymen and women in action, bringing their classroom learning to life. In addition to the Capitol Building, students also toured the New York State Museum, which is filled with curricular connections, including exploring a replica of a longhouse and walking the streets of New York City. It was amazing to see how much interest students had in their own learning, reading all about the exhibits, participating in interactive pieces and adding even more to their learning of New York State!

It is one thing to read about how the Erie Canal contributed to the growth of New York and the nation, it is another to go back in time and experience it in real life. This year, students visited Chittenango Landing. Using their archeological skills, students dug for artifacts that told the story of people along the canal. Interested in what a canal boat looks like? Ask a fourth grader! One of the stations they visited was a canal boat. Here, they had the opportunity to listen to "Grandma" tell the story of life on the canal. They even participated in a little boat cleanup!

The Women's Rights Museum in Seneca Falls was the culminating trip this year. Students spent time in the classroom learning about Susan B. Anthony and others whose voices were used to make changes in our world. The visit to the museum allowed them to deepen their understanding of how these people impacted New York State and the world.

The Butterflies are Coming!

Our second graders worked for several weeks to prepare the butterfly garden at TES. They planted seeds, weeded, made clay signage to label plants, and made butterfly watering bowls. This Maker Lab unit directly connected to the science unit on "Animals and Plants." Students developed a greater understanding of the plant and insect interdependent relationship; as well as human impact on plants and animals. While the butterfly garden continues to improve each year, our goal is to have an increased diversity of plants to support the butterflies.

History Comes to Life



Fourth graders brought history to life with their project called "Voices of Change." Fourth graders were given the opportunity to select a person to research. Each person was someone who made a historical change in NY State. Students researched their person, took notes about how their chosen person made a change in the world, obstacles they encountered and actions taken to reach their goal. The goal for each fourth grader was to get to know their person well enough to "become" them!

Using evidence from research, the fourth graders were able to create a backdrop that told the story of how their person made a change. Included on this backdrop was a timeline of important events, struggles, hardships and achievements of the historical figures.

In the end, students participated in a Living Museum where visitors were entertained by fourth graders dressed as historical figures. Transforming into these historical people, fourth graders were able to transport their guests back in time to teach them the importance of each person's life achievements. Visitors to the Living Museum were truly able to learn something memorable that night!

Sixth Grade Carnival

Students worked together to write a carnival game idea proposal, plan a design, and then build a carnival game from cardboard. The carnival is the culminating event resulting from research on charitable organizations and the statistics and probability unit in math.

The Francis House was the organization that students voted to receive a donation of all proceeds. The mission of the Francis House is to provide a home and extended family to persons with terminal illnesses, so that they can die with dignity.

Once the organization was determined, students wrote a proposal letter pitching their ideas. The letter included the name and objective of the game, a statistical question that could be answered by collecting data during the carnival, and a description of the game. Once the proposal was approved, construction of the games began.

The carnival was a big success! A big thank you to all the families who sent quarters in with their child to purchase tickets.

From the Superintendent



First, congratulations to the members of the Class of 2018, and thank you to family and friends who attended our annual Commencement Ceremony on June 22nd. Graduation is one of my favorite events of the school year. I always enjoy greeting our graduates on stage, and seeing in their eyes the happiness that comes from their sense of accomplishment.

Second, congratulations to our sixth graders, the members of the Class of 2024. As they enter seventh grade, they will be making the transition from the Elementary School to the Junior/Senior High School. With this transition, comes additional responsibility and additional opportunities.

Third, congratulations to our retirees. At the conclusion of the 2017-18 school year, we had six members of our faculty and staff retire (see photo on page 7). Collectively, this group of retirees had 174 years of service with the Tully Central School District. I would like to say thank you to this group of people for the work they have done over the years.

Regarding our 2018 Capital Project, we anticipate that in September the parking lots will be finished. This means that beginning this September there will be three important changes to traffic patterns on campus. First, parent drop-off at the Elementary School will be moved from State Street on to the campus. Second, parent drop-off at the Junior/Senior High School will be to the front of the building, in the area that in the past has served as the JSHS bus circle. Third, buses will load and unload all students from a central point in the middle of campus. These three changes should create a safer environment for our students.
