What has been the best part of your high school career and why? The best part of my high school career has honestly been making the good social bonds that I have today. Without good people to go through school with, high school gets exponentially

harder.

What is your proudest moment in high school so far? My proudest moment so far has been helping others or being there for people in the same way that people have been there for me. I know it meant a lot to me when I needed it.

What are your plans after high school? I plan on going out of state to study mortuary science to hopefully become a mortician or something similar.

Where do you see yourself in ten years? I don't know. I don't like to plan that far ahead. If I set high expectations for myself and don't meet them, I won't be able to appreciate all the things I've accomplished. All I hope for myself in ten years is that I'm not alone and unhappy.

What challenges have you faced and how have you overcome them? There's been a lot of challenges such as the upkeep of my own mental health over the course of my school career, being around the struggles of those close to me, and needing a lot of perseverance as both the first person to go through the processes of transitioning in the school system and in being the first transgender person I knew in general. There are people in the school who I've never spoken to and who have never spoken to me who have at some point been told by someone that I was trans. For a while, that looming fear that people were saying something about me without me knowing really bugged me. I knew that if I ever wanted to address it, it wouldn't get any better. I'm more okay with being trans now than I was in the beginning. I've made my peace with it and with people knowing. People can say whatever they want and if they have a problem, that's for them to cope with.

Who's your hero and why? I don't really have a "hero" per say but there's been a lot of good inspirations in my life. In my real life, some of the good upperclassman friends I made before they graduated were kind to me when I felt otherwise alone. Outside of people I personally know, Caitlin Doughty who was one of my first introductions to death as something we shouldn't fear, also inspired me.

**People/Pets in your family:** Michele (mother), Jody (father), Hannah and Katie (sisters) and Molly (my dog).

What has been the best part of your high school career and why? The best part of my high school career was the cross country trip to New Jersey. I was able to be a part of an amazing team that got along really well. Living with my teammates for a couple days, running one of my best times for the season,

and riding roller coasters with my teammates are all things that made the trip the best part of my high school career.

What have you learned from the activities you have participated in at school? Through activities like sports and drama I have learned patience, time management, work ethic, and many other important skills. All of these skills are things that will greatly benefit me later in life.

Who's your hero and why? My hero is my grandfather, William Young. My grandfather was a hard-working farmer who barely knew the meaning of quitting. When I was younger, my grandfather was diagnosed with cancer and was told he had about three years left. Despite this short timeframe, my grandfather pushed to stay alive and ended up living a lot longer. My grandfather's dedication and hard work is something I look up to, and that's why my grandfather is my hero.

#### **Private Transportation Requests**

NYS Education Law Section 3635(2) requires that a written request be made to the Board of Education of a school district when transportation of a student to a non-public, private, or parochial school is required. This written request must be made annually and received by the school district no later than April 1st for transportation for the next school year. Most non-public schools have a form available to make this request and can be contacted for assistance.

#### **Health and Safety Reminders**

Due to the time of year, please be aware of the daily temperature and dress accordingly. Even if snow is not present, be aware that sidewalks may still be icy. Drivers on campus need to make sure that ALL windows are clear of snow and ice to see clearly. This is not only good practice, but also the law. The speed limit on campus is 15 mph at all times. Elementary parents should make every effort to un/load children from the passenger side of the vehicle when dropping/picking up. # **From the Superintendent**



Now that we are in the swing of 2023, I'd like to share a few upcoming initiatives and opportunities for our students and staff members.

The Seal of Civic Readiness will be a new opportunity for our students. The New York State Education Department defines civic readiness as, "...the ability to make a positive difference in the public life of our communities through the combination of civic knowledge, skills and action, mindsets, and experiences." The Seal of Civic Readiness will build upon the foundation of civic education

already found in public high schools. Earning the Seal would be a distinction on both the high school transcript and diploma. This opportunity will also bring a new +1 pathway for graduation, meaning students would take and pass the four required Regents exams and complete the Civics pathway. In order to offer this opportunity to students, the District will form a team to complete the application process with an implementation plan to become an approved high school.

Last month, our Academic Advisement Committee reviewed the Computer Science and Digital Fluency Learning Standards. The New York State Education Department's vision for these Standards is, "Every student will know how to live productively and safely in a technology-dominated world. This includes understanding the essential features of digital technologies, why and how they work, and how to communicate and create using those technologies." Though the Standards were adopted by the Board of Regents in 2020, they are not required to be fully implemented until September 2024. The five key areas of the Standards are impacts of computing, computational thinking, networks and system design, cybersecurity, and digital literacy. The remainder of this school year and all of next year will be focused on capacity building through curriculum development and professional learning.

Finally, each year the District schedules Superintendent's Conference Days to offer all staff members opportunities for professional learning and growth. On March 13, 2023, there will be no school for students for this very reason. In the morning, all staff members will engage in Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) training with OCM BOCES trainers. The two trainers are Kathryn Daughton, Director of Educational Programs, and Alyssa Haymore, Coordinator of DEI. In the afternoon, professional learning will be roledependent with many continuing to work toward a more aligned, guaranteed, and viable curriculum.

#### Nominating Petitions Available for Board of Education Positions

Two terms of office on the Tully Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2023. Each winner will be elected for three year terms from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2026 at the annual school district election to be held on May 16, 2023.

Board of Education vacancies are not considered to be separate specific offices. This nominating petition does not describe a specific vacancy. Each candidate is considered for a vacant seat on the Board of Education as a whole and not as only to a specific office presently held by an individual.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, Tully Central School District Offices, 20 State St, Tully, NY 13159 no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 21, 2023. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures.

Under the law a qualified voter is one who is entitled to vote at a school district election. To be entitled to vote a person must meet these three qualifications: 1.) A citizen of the United States. 2.) At least 18 years of age. 3.) A resident of the school district for a period of at least 30 days prior to the election.
