

TES welcomed Officer Glen Wintermute onto their campus last month, giving Tully CSD an SRO at each building. Officer Wintermute is a retired police officer from Dewitt. He worked patrol for twentytwo years, serving his community and creating strong bonds with the kids in his area. Even after his four children grew up and moved out, he continued to create those relationships with young people outside of his work by coaching Pop Warner football, Little League baseball, and a few varsity-level sports here at Tully. Officer Wintermute has always believed, "that by creating a strong, positive bond between police and kids ensures a strong and bright future for both." In 2020, he began working in and around Tully CSD by delivering lunches to students' homes during Covid, assisting with the traffic on our school grounds, and then driving a bus. His work here at Tully eventually came back to Officer Wintermute jumping back into the police officer role, becoming TES's SRO through Marcellus Police Department. Tully CSD is very glad to welcome Officer Wintermute on campus and he is "very excited and I look forward to the future here at Tully Elementary and the entire district. I take the safety and security of our children (our future) very seriously."

Rocket Launch Success

This year's Maker Space started off with successful rocket launches by the 5th and 6th graders. Fifteen students participated in the four-week course, planning and building their rockets to

unique specifications. Students measured frames, mounted rockets, and glued launch lugs, among other necessary tasks. They then were able to paint their rocket in whatever design they chose.

On two different days, parents were able to come and watch as the students fired their rockets off behind the



school. It was exciting for the students to watch their creations go from a bunch of parts to a real rocket flying upwards of 150 feet in the air.

The students cheered each other on as they ran to catch the parachute that came out of their rocket midair. For some, this Maker Space kindles a rocketry hobby as their rockets are reusable. December's Maker Lab was for kindergarten through third grade and focused on holiday crafting. More Maker Spaces will be offered throughout the winter and spring.

Principal's Message

Happy New Year's and welcome to 2023! We wish all our families a happy and healthy New Year! We are now in the home stretch of the first semester with the second marking period ending on Friday, January 27th. As always, we encourage all of our students to finish their semester-long courses strong and begin preparing for midterms and finals. Hopefully, students continue to take advantage of direct academic support offered by all our teachers during Activity Period each day after school, except Tuesdays.

In the coming weeks, students in the Junior-Senior High School will begin working on their schedules for next year with their counselors. Decisions on courses for the next year need to be made for each student based on their current interests, future goals, and their aspirations following high school. Based on those goals, it is important that every student selects the courses that fit their individual academic journey. While all students take courses and electives that will allow them to meet graduation requirements, students will also have the opportunity to take coursework at an increased level

of rigor throughout their high school career. We encourage families to have extended conversations regarding what courses are most beneficial for their student(s). Colleges will look at the level of course rigor on a transcript and how a student performs throughout that course.

When students meet with their counselors, teacher recommendations are reviewed to facilitate conversations as we build next year's schedule for each student. Students who participate in honors, accelerated, Advanced Placement (AP), and college courses will be required to complete more work independently; engage in a higher level of critical thinking and problem solving; and be willing to write not only more frequently, but also longer pieces in styles that are new and/or unfamiliar. Depending on the course, there may be additional requirements such as labs, research projects, standardized tests, and lengthy writing assignments. Colleges offering courses at our school may require their own prerequisites and/or testing requirements that are beyond our control.

School counselors work hard to communicate course selections with students and their parents through meetings, classroom presentation, or having parents sign-off on course selections. Counselors are always happy to meet with parents at any time. Those appointments can be arranged by contacting the Counseling and Career Center at 315-696-6240.

Seal of Biliteracy

For the past four years, Tully JSHS has participated in the NYS Seal of Biliteracy. This is a program that recognizes high school graduates who have attained a high level of proficiency in all areas of a world language in addition to English. Not only does this program help encourage students to study a language other than their native language, but it affirms the value of societal diversity. There are many positive outcomes of this program which include the recognition of the student



being multi-lingual for further educational endeavors or career prospects. Students that want to obtain the Seal of Biliteracy are required to present a rigorous culminating project to a panel in April. In the past, Tully has had twelve students attain this honor. This year, six more students will present their projects with the hopes of their diploma being designated with the Seal of Biliteracy.

Senior to Represent Tully at Syracuse Delegation

Senior Emerson Santos has been a star student and athlete here at Tully since emigrating here from Guatemala. He was recently ac-



cepted to participate in the Puerto Rican Hispanic Youth Leadership Institute representing Tully under the Syracuse Delegation. From the Superintendent



It is crazy to think we are already in January. Happy New Year! I hope you found time over the holiday recess to rest, relax, and make memories with friends and family. As I begin my second month in Tully, I want to thank the entire community for the warm welcome. It has been an honor to begin building relationships with our students, staff members, families, and community members. I look forward to continuing our work together.

The new year is a good time to remind the community of the procedures we follow to keep our school community safe and

secure. The well-being of our students is the top priority of all who serve and support in Tully. As in previous years, students and staff members will practice five safety drills. They are bus safety drills, fire drills, emergency evacuation drills, lockdown drills, and lockout drills.

Students and staff members will participate in a minimum of twelve drills each year with eight required prior to December 31, 2022. Of the twelve required drills, eight must be evacuation drills and four must be lockdown drills. In addition to the drills, all staff members receive annual training on emergency response plans, including training on violence prevention and mental health.

Mr. Ray Herrick serves the Tully Central School District as our School Resource Officer (SRO). In addition to Mr. Herrick, the district has welcomed a second SRO for the 2022-2023 school year, Mr. Glen Wintermute. Our School Resource Officers are responsible for assessing the effectiveness of our safety drills and for coordinating required annual training. They work closely with staff members to provide support for our students and their families. They act as first responders, should there be a critical incident, and coordinate with other first responders (police, fire, paramedics) as needed.

Similar to last year, the District Health and Safety Committee will meet regularly. The purpose and role of this committee is to perform the duties and guidelines prescribed in NYSED law, review recommendations from the building-based and district teams, assist in the investigation and management of health and safety related concerns, and make recommendations to the Principals, Superintendent of Schools, and/or Board of Education to implement recommendations, as appropriate.

This notification system allows school administrators to contact all parents/guardians and staff by phone, email, and text, in order to communicate information about emergencies, school closings, delays, early dismissals, important school events, and reminders.
