



From The Desk of the Superintendent

Included in this issue of the Knight Insight is information on the educational program for our students and the proposed 2023-2024 school budget. Next year's proposed budget maintains all academic, athletic, co-curricular, and social-emotional student programs currently in place. In addition, it capitalizes on the last year of the federal stimulus funds to maximize the post-COVID academic and mental health support offered to all students.

The Board of Education has proposed a budget with a local tax levy increase of 1.87% which is below last year's increase of 1.90%. This proposed tax levy increase is, in part, because New York State has indicated a minimum increase of 3.00% in Foundation Aid for Tully CSD next year.

Included on the ballot in May are three other propositions in addition to the proposed budget. The first is a capital improvement project consisting of a gas tank/island replacement at the District bus garage. Our fuel tank is 25+ years old and is at the end of its life. In addition, the columns on the fuel island canopy are rusted beyond repair. Because the proposed project is matching debt schedules (old debt coming off and new debt going on), we can minimize the burden to our taxpayers.

Also included on the ballot is a proposition for student transportation. This includes the lease of three 66-passenger school buses, one 54-passenger wheelchair bus, and one 30-passenger bus. This is part of our annual vehicle and equipment replacement plan in each year's budget. Finally, the Tully Free Library tax will be Proposition IV.

All community members are invited and encouraged to attend this year's Public Budget Hearing on Monday, May 8, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. in the Junior-Senior High School. The Public Budget Hearing provides an excellent opportunity for community members to learn about the proposed budget and ask questions and/or provide feedback. We welcome all input from the community as we strive to develop a budget that reflects the needs and values of our district. We believe that this proposed budget will help us continue to provide our students with an excellent education.

Tully Elementary Program Information

Tully Elementary School offers a comprehensive educational program in grades PK-6 to meet the academic, social/emotional, and behavioral needs of students. The English Language Arts curriculum contains a combination of programs, including Fountas & Pinnell Classroom and Heggerty. Teachers are also receiving additional training in the fundamentals of the “Science of Reading” and evidenced-based practices. Math instruction is aligned with the Next Generation Standards using the Investigations program. In social studies, teachers are implementing the C3 Framework and state standards along with integrating inquiry-based units. Science instruction is aligned with the New York State science learning standards and in-depth study using curriculum materials from the Smithsonian. In addition to the core subjects of ELA, math, science, and social studies, students also receive instruction in art, library, music, and physical education. Physical education is offered daily in grades k-4. Students with special needs receive services as indicated on their Individualized Education Program (IEP) and we provide ell services for students whose native language is not English.

New York State assessments occur in ELA and math for grades 3-6. Next year, NYS will begin testing in science at grade 5.

Our social-emotional learning and safety education program is conducted using the Positivity Project, Second Step, and classroom sessions facilitated by our social workers. Tully also has partnered with Helio Health to offer an on-site mental health clinic for students and families. We continue to employ a “middle school” model for 5th and 6th grade, and all classes incorporate the tenets of Responsive Classroom. Each student has access to their own Chromebook which provides access to a wealth of information and Google Classrooms, allowing students to truly learn from anywhere.

This year, we were able to add an agriculture course at grade 6 for all students. Our co-curricular clubs and activities continue to be very active. These include the Buddy Program, Art Club, Maker Club, Intramurals, Safety Patrol, Yearbook, Pens, Pencils, and More, Jazz Band, 3rd/4th Chorus, NYSSMA, and All-County. Our 5th/6th grade musical delighted audiences, and school spirit and community service were promoted through events like food drives, a 5th/6th dance, special clothing days, spirit weeks, and an author visit which was sponsored by our PTO.

Junior-Senior High Academic Program

At Tully Junior-Senior High School, we offer a college and career-ready curriculum that provides students with the required courses and optional electives for graduation. Students can challenge themselves by taking Advanced Placement courses in English, Statistics, Calculus, United States History, World History, Biology, Chemistry, and Physics, as well as honors courses in English and social studies. Our 8th graders have the opportunity to take accelerated courses in Living Environment and Algebra for high school credit. Several faculty members teach courses in Pre-Calculus, Business and Finance, Spanish, and English as part of our partnership with Onondaga Community College. We also have articulation agreements with SUNY Morrisville and SUNY Cobleskill for most of our agriculture courses. In order to provide our students with the best opportunities possible, new elective courses in English and social studies were introduced this year such as the 1980's, Public Speaking, Creative Writing, and Film. Support is provided to those in need through Academic Intervention Services (AIS) and special education. We also offer courses and CTE programs through partnerships with BOCES.

Students transition from the elementary school to 7th grade through a series of activities including an individual annual review with a junior high counselor, a "Welcome Day" on May 25th, and an orientation in August. Early in the school year, we host a curriculum night when parents can learn about courses and classroom expectations. Our junior high program includes flex classes that offer opportunities for enrichment, support, and project-based learning activities. Also in 7th and 8th grade, students take a variety of coursework in both career-technical education and the fine arts in addition to their core curriculum, offering the opportunity to have an understanding of the future elective options available in those subject areas. Beginning this year, our Spanish program begins in the 7th grade. Our school counseling program includes career education and exploration, academic review and support, classroom instruction, and individual counseling. Additionally, the junior high counselor provides social-emotional learning and prevention education through the Second Step Education Program for all junior high students. We also have a school social worker available for students at all grade levels to support their mental health and wellness.

Tully JSHS offers 33 extra-curricular activities for our students to participate. We are happy to offer 21 Varsity sports with many additional athletic opportunities at the Junior Varsity, Modified, and Junior High levels. At the junior-senior high school, we are proud to report that we have an 86% participation rate within the student body this year! At least 86% of our students participate in at least one extracurricular activity or sport!

Frequently Asked Questions

Is the district “tax cap compliant”?

Yes, the proposed tax levy (before exclusions) is at the tax levy limit. A simple majority (50 percent plus one) is needed for budget approval. Being tax cap compliant means Tully Central School District property taxpayers will still receive either the Basic or Enhanced STAR exemption or credit.

What does the property tax cap law mean for my tax bill?

It is important to remember that the tax cap law only determines how much voter support is needed to pass the budget. It does not impose a universal 2 percent cap – or any other specific amount – on taxes. It applies to the tax levy, not to tax rates or individual bills. Keep in mind, several factors dictate how an individual’s school tax bill is calculated after a school district sets the final tax levy—including changes in property values and equalization rates – none of which are within the district’s control. This calculation process did not change under New York’s property tax cap law.

What happens if the budget is not approved by voters?

If a proposed budget is defeated by voters, a school district has a couple of options: The school district could put the same budget up for a re-vote; the school district could decide to put a revised budget up for a vote; or, a school district could decide to adopt a contingent budget. If a proposed budget is defeated twice by voters, a school district must adopt a contingent budget. If a school adopts a contingent budget, some very specific items must be excluded, for example, funding for community use of the schools, certain types of specific salary increases, and new equipment purchases. Additionally, under our current “tax cap” legislation, a school district that adopts a contingent budget may not increase its current tax levy by any amount. This, in effect, translates into a zero percent tax increase.

PROPOSITION I

Shall the Board of Education of the Tully Central School District be authorized to expend the sum of Twenty-Three Million, Five Hundred Ninety-Five Thousand, Seventy-One Dollars (**\$23,595,071**) as General Fund appropriations for the school year 2023-2024 and levy the necessary tax therefor?

Special note: Included within this proposed budget, the district will use the established Repair Reserve for the following: An amount not to exceed \$56,000 to replace the Community Fitness Center floor and an amount not to exceed \$80,000 to repair the districtwide parking areas.

PROPOSITION II

Capital Improvement Project

Shall the Board of Education undertake a project consisting of a gas tank/island replacement project at and renovations to the District bus garage, including site improvements, original furnishings, fixtures and equipment, architectural fees, and all other costs incidental to such work (the “Project”) at a total estimated cost not to exceed \$825,000, and obtain the necessary funds by using any available State building aid, \$260,000 from the District’s Capital Reserve, and, to the extent necessary, the levy of a tax upon the taxable property of the School District to be collected in annual installments in the years and in the amounts as the Board of Education shall determine and in anticipation of such tax shall the School District be authorized to issue up to \$565,000 of obligations of the School District and levy a tax to pay the interest thereon when due?

PROPOSITION III

Student Transportation


Shall the Board of Education lease, finance three (3) 66-passenger school buses, one (1) 54-passenger wheelchair accessible bus, and one (1) 30-passenger bus at an estimated cost not to exceed \$543,960, including necessary furnishings, fixtures and equipment, and all other necessary costs incidental thereto and to expend a total sum not to exceed \$543,960, which is estimated to be the total maximum cost thereof, and levy a tax which is hereby voted for the foregoing in the amount of \$543,960, which shall be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education and in anticipation of the collection of such tax, issue a lease of the district at one time, or from time to time, in the lease amount not to exceed \$543,960 and levy a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on such obligations when due?

PROPOSITION IV

Tully Free Library Tax

For the purpose of funding the Tully Free Library, shall the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Two Thousand, Nine Hundred Forty-Four Dollars (\$222,944) be raised by annual levy of a tax upon the taxable real property within the Tully Central School District?
