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### **From the Superintendent**



As we begin the school year, I wanted to make the Tully Community aware of our Board of Education's committee structure. Listed below are 2021-22 BOE sub-committees, along with a short description of the purpose for each committee:

Audit Committee: The Audit Committee advises the full Board on the external audit activities of the school district. The audit

committee helps the Board provide fiscal oversight of the school district and may provide comments or recommendations regarding proposed financial decisions.

**Policy Committee**: The Policy Committee discusses current and proposed policies, considers revisions to policies as suggested by the Erie1BOCES policy service or by district legal counsel, considers new policies as appropriate, and makes recommendations to the full Board regarding new policies, revisions to existing policies, and elimination of extraneous policies.

Academic Advisory Committee: The Academic Advisory Committee discusses current academic/instructional programs, considers priorities for refining, improving, and/or expanding academic opportunities for students, and makes recommendations to the full Board regarding matters related to the district's academic program.

Athletic Advisory Committee: The Athletic Advisory Committee discusses current athletic programs, considers priorities for refining, improving, and/or expanding athletic opportunities, and makes recommendations to the Board regarding matters related to the district's current and future athletic program.

**Facilities Committee**: The Facilities Committee discusses current conditions of the school facility, considers priorities for improvement provided through the Building Condition Survey (BCS), and makes recommendations to the full Board regarding short-term capital improvements.

**Health & Safety Committee**: The School Safety Committee coordinates current safety and security processes, programs, and protocols, considers priorities for refining, improving school safety, and makes recommendations to the Board regarding the district's school safety and security program. Additionally, this committee investigates and addresses any Capital Project-related safety complaints.

Wellness Committee: The Wellness Committee meets at least four times per year to establish goals for, and oversee the development of the District's wellness policy. The Committee makes policy recommendations for review and adoption by the Board, and is responsible for assessing current wellness activities, programs, and policies available in the District.

Currently, community representatives serve as members of the Audit Committee, the Facilities Committee, and the Health & Safety Committee.
