



Boys Varsity Soccer Makes it to State Semifinals



The boys varsity soccer team has been a strong contender this year, challenging almost any school in Section 3 to play as hard as possible when up against the Black Knights. To get to regionals, the team beat Thousand Islands and Cooperstown, then Manlius-Pebble Hill in the semifinals, and Fabius-Pompey in the finals. The regional semifinals were especially challenging because it was a back and forth game that went into double overtime. During the second overtime period, Julian Shay pulled off a goal

that won the game. After regionals, the Black Knights beat out Southern Cayuga, putting them in the state final four.

With this being the first time in history for the boys varsity soccer team to make it to states, the District was excited with students showing their support of the team. A spirit day was held at the JSHS the day before state semifinals were held, with students donning red and black clothing, jerseys, sweatshirts, and face paint. The halls were abuzz with well wishes for the team and plans were made for a watch party to be held.

The boys varsity soccer team left the evening before the state semifinals were held with parents and students watching as they pulled out of the parking lot. The day of the game, the weather was sunny and cool. Tully had a point lead against Alleghany-Limestone but eventually fell 3-2. Even though the game was lost, we couldn't be more proud of the team working together to make it as far as they did. They definitely set the bar high for upcoming teams.

Another historical record was made this year with Ryan Rauber surpassing the most career goals in school history, scoring a whopping twenty-four goals. With eight seniors graduating this year, including Rauber, several underclassmen will step into leading roles next year with high hopes that they can make it back to the state level.



As a friendly reminder, for the safety of our students, staff, and faculty, there is **no through traffic allowed** between the high school and elementary school while school buses are parked.

PreK/K Registration

Tully Central School is starting the Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten Registration process for the 2025-2026 school year. If you have not already done so, please register your child(ren) online at <http://www.tullyschools.org>.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, children must be district residents and turn 4 years of age, but not yet reach age 5, by December 1, 2025. For the 2025-2026 school year, Tully Elementary School is able to accommodate a maximum of 36 students in pre-kindergarten. If more than 36 students have been registered for pre-kindergarten by January 31, 2025, the District will need to conduct a lottery to determine enrollment and organize a waiting list. Please note that Pre-K is a 5-days-a-week, full-day program (8:00 a.m. - 2:30 p.m.) and the District cannot provide school bus transportation until a child is 4 years old.

To enter kindergarten, children must be at least 5 years of age, and no older than 6 years of age, by December 1, 2025. Unlike pre-kindergarten, there is no limit on the number of district-resident kindergarten students who can be enrolled at Tully Elementary.

Information about the screening process for both grade levels will be mailed out to enrolled students in the spring. Please don't hesitate to contact the elementary office at 315-696-6213 if you have specific questions about the registration or screening process.

Principal's Message



We hope that everyone had a wonderful and restful Thanksgiving holiday and enjoyed the company of friends and family. As we start to think about shorter days and the winter season ahead, it's hard to believe that we are only a few weeks away from the winter holiday recess and the beginning of 2025!

A month ago, we held our annual leadership training program called Daneli Partners. The training was facilitated by leadership professionals from the Daneli Partners group, spearheaded by retired teacher and coach, Paul Muench. Over the past two years, these facilitators have formed relationships and bonds with our students, and have even written college letters of recommendations for some of our leaders. Mr. Dando, Ms. Krumbach, and I are the staff liaisons for this leadership opportunity. The student leaders of this program are the sophomore class officers and returning juniors and seniors who have participated in the program in the past. We had about 20 students spend the morning learning about their own leadership styles and strengths. Before the training, each student took the Gallup Clifton Strengths Assessment. This survey informed each student of their individual leadership strengths, which they then used to have group conversations about how to use their individual skills as leaders in the building, in their activities, on their teams, and within their clubs. The students told the staff liaisons that the training was great! Part two of this year's training, with the same students, will take place in early February. We are also expanding the program and are planning a field trip to a few businesses in the area to learn about leadership opportunities in a professional setting in addition to a trip to meet with two local districts who also have the program to work on networking skills with our leaders. We are excited to see what these student leaders can do in our school community!

Additionally, we like to remind all of our families that every student has the opportunity for continual academic support. Please remember that every day, except for Tuesdays, we offer our Activity Period directly following 9th period. Culture Corner China



Did you know that the fortune cookie isn't really from China? Although the fortune cookie has been thought to be of Chinese culture, Japanese immigrants brought this treat to San Francisco in the early 1900s. Inventions that can actually be traced back to China are paper, the compass, and paper money. China is also known for the Great Wall of China - the longest man-made structure in the world. Something interesting about the Great Wall is that much of the mortar (the glue that holds the bricks together) was made from sticky rice! A well-known animal native to China is the giant panda. These cuddly-looking creatures are actually good swimmers and can eat up to 84 pounds of bamboo a day! Another interesting animal tidbit is that many Chinese children keep crickets as pets, which may or may not be soothing due to their chirping noise. Speaking of noise, geese can be seen on the police force instead of dogs due to their aggressive behaviors. (If you were ever chased by a goose, you may understand why they do this.) Chinese culture has many celebrations which you may have heard of, but did you know the Chinese New Year celebration actually lasts for fifteen days? It starts at the end of January and with each new year, one of twelve animals represent that year. This year is the snake. You can learn so much more about China and their culture by asking some of our students about their familial ties to China or by doing some research. No matter what you find, it will surely be interesting!
