The ceremony before the games where each player gifted a t-shirt to a cancer survivor or a family member in honor of their battle was documented with lots of hugs. PreK/K Registration

Tully Central School is starting the Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten Registration process for the 2026-2027 school year. If you have not already done so, please register your child(ren) online at <http://www.tullyschools.org>.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, children must be district residents and turn four years of age, but not yet reach age five, by December 1, 2026. Eligibility applies to students born between December 2, 2021 and December 1, 2022. For the 2026-2027 school year, Tully Elementary School is able to accommodate a maximum of thirty-six (36) students in pre-kindergarten. If more than thirty-six students have been registered for pre-kindergarten by January 31, 2026, the District will need to conduct a lottery to determine enrollment and organize a waiting list. Please note that Pre-K is a five-days-a-week, full-day program (8:00 - 2:30) and the District does not provide school bus transportation until a child is four years old.

To enter kindergarten, children must be at least five years of age and no older than six years of age by December 1, 2026. Unlike pre-kindergarten, there is no limit on the number of district-resident kindergarten students who can be enrolled at Tully Elementary. Students who are already enrolled in our Pre-K program do not need to register again for kindergarten; those students are automatically enrolled in kindergarten.

Information about the screening process for both grade levels will be mailed out to enrolled students in the spring. Please don't hesitate to contact the elementary office at 315-696-6213 if you have specific questions about the registration or screening process.

Racking Up Compliments

Mrs. Hudon's second grade class is racking up the compliments this year! So many, in fact, that they have earned themselves their very first compliment party. If you are wondering what a compliment party is, look no further. A compliment party is a celebration of good behavior and is earned by the entire class. 

Physical Education Adventures

Setting Sail in the Name of Research

This past summer, Beth Tucker, one of Tully's JSHS science teachers was elected along fourteen other educators to join the Shipboard Science Immersion program and set sail on Lake Michigan aboard the EPA Lake Guardian for a week to conduct research. Tucker worked alongside scientists to conduct water quality testing, soil sampling, and scanning the lakebed with sonar for various reasons such as looking for invasive species and ancient hunting grounds. By working on the vessel, Tucker not only got to contribute to real-time research and propose future solutions, but she also got to work with Sea Grant literacy specialists to develop lessons for her classroom. Tucker stated in the Shipboard Science Immersion press release that, "Students benefit from analyzing real-world data, constructing conclusions, and discussing the effects on ecosystems" and is "looking forward to incorporating the scientific data collected on Lake Michigan into my water science curriculum." While Tucker used this experience to pass on knowledge to her students, she was grateful for the opportunity to learn so many things herself including how important fresh water lakes are to our planet.



Culture Corner: EL SALVADORE

All aboard the chicken bus! Did you ever wonder what happens to school buses once they are no longer used by a school here in America? Some of them are converted and sent

to places like El Salvador. There, they are brightly painted and called chicken buses. This is their main form of public transportation.

El Salvador is a small country (smaller than the state of Massachusetts) in Central America with a large population. People who live there are used to earthquakes and volcanic activity and know their home as the "Land of Volcanoes." In fact, you can see the image of volcanoes on their flag.

The main language is Spanish; however, most of the people are mestizo, descendants of Spanish and Indian ancestors. Half of the population lives rurally and are poor, not being able to afford meat and falling ill to malnutrition.

While this country is beautiful and is home to a rain forest full of plant and wildlife, El Salvador isn't a place that garners many tourists. You can learn more about El Salvador and its people on National Geographic. You can also get involved in community service that helps countries such as El Salvador.





