



FFA Students Compete at National Level

Ten FFA students took to the road and made their way to Indianapolis, Indiana for the 96th National FFA Convention and Expo at the end of October. Students began making their way through Pennsylvania, stopping to tour the Longwood Gardens and the New Holland Plant, a tractor manufacturing plant. They then witnessed a live auction at the New Holland Auction Barn. Traveling through West Virginia, they enjoyed a fun detour to Cabela's. In Ohio, they visited the Ohio State University Vet College. Once in Indianapolis, students participated in the Expo, presentations, and workshops while in the Convention Center, community service throughout Indianapolis, and award ceremonies and keynote speakers in Lucas Oil Stadium when they weren't competing. Seniors Megan Weisbrodt and Lily Darling went on stage to receive the Star Chapter Award. Tully was recognized as a two-star chapter this year. Ashlynn Lucas-Santos competed in Spanish Creed Speaking, and while she didn't move on from the first round of competition, the FFA advisors couldn't be more proud of her dedication, not to mention she was one of the youngest participants at the National level. The Conduct of a Chapter Meeting team consisting of Mary Adams, Meadow Bassett, Hunter Bennett, Addison Brown, Reagan Flanagan, Brier Huggins, and Jaxson Willis, also did well for such a young team and received a bronze ranking within the competition. In the very little spare time while at Nationals, the FFA students fit in an Indy scavenger hunt, the zoo, a rodeo, and a game night, along with some homework/study sessions. At the end of the convention, students got to see Tully alumni Ty Edinger and Katie Haier receive their American Degree - another proud FFA advisor moment. PreK/K Registration

It's hard to believe with seven months of the school year left, but we are starting our Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten Registration process for the 2024-2025 school year. If you have not already done so, please register your child(ren) online at <http://www.tullyschools.org>.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, children must be district residents and turn 4 years of age, but not yet reach age 5, by December 1, 2024. For the 2024-2025 school year, Tully Elementary School is able to accommodate a maximum of 54 students in pre-kindergarten. If more than 54 students have been registered for pre-kindergarten by January 31, 2024, the District will need to conduct a lottery to determine enrollment and organize a waiting list. Please note that pre-k is a full-day program, and we cannot provide school bus transportation until a child is 4 years old.

To enter kindergarten, children must be at least 5 years of age, and no older than 6 years of age, by December 1, 2024. Unlike pre-kindergarten, there is no limit on the number of district-resident kindergarten students who can be enrolled at Tully Elementary.

Information about the screening process for both grade levels will be mailed out to enrolled students in the spring. Please don't hesitate to contact the elementary office at 315-696-6213 if you have specific questions about the registration or screening process.

Fall Recap

The 2023 Tully varsity athletic fall season was a huge success! The Varsity Golf team set a school record for wins, finishing the season 14-2. The continued development of the golfers was evident all fall as they continued to post new low scores each and every match, playing some of their best golf at the end of the season.

The Varsity Boys Soccer team finished the year with 16 wins, a sectional finals appearance, and a top NYS ranking for Class C. The boys' soccer team battled all year and had a great season.

Burger Cook Off



The Animal Science class got to taste their work during the Beef Cattle Unit, along with some volunteer judges. Learning about different cuts of beef, students had to prepare and cook burgers that contained one secret ingredient, a variety of seasonings, toppings, and condiments. In groups of two, students cooked two burgers - one to cut into quarters for the judges and one to cut in half for themselves. They then named and presented their burger to the judges in the Burger Cook Off Challenge much like you may see on cooking shows. The Happy Bacon Cheeseburger with bacon being the secret ingredient took the win while the Double B burger with paprika for the secret ingredient took second, and the MD Special with banana peppers for the secret ingredient took third. Students were judged on appearance, taste, topping combination, and presentation. No matter if you were a competitor or a judge, the burger cook off was a tasty lesson!

Science in Action: Visiting the Mudboils



Students in the Environmental Science class took a field trip to witness the effects of what mining can do to our land. Mudboils, a natural, but rare, phenomenon created when an area of land collapses and springs of pressurized water bring sediment and mud to the surface, were first documented right here in Tully. These "mud volcanoes" discharge a rate of twenty tons of silt a day, according to onondaganation.org, which then floods into Onondaga Lake, polluting it and making wildlife almost nonexistent. Not only did the mining indirectly affect the water systems, it continues to affect the hills, creating sinkholes, rock fissures, and mudslides. Many Tully natives remember the mudslide that happened in 1993, which was a direct result of the mining. Environmentalists believe it is important that our younger generations learn about the unique geology in the area, the impact that humans can have upon our land, and how we can help it, which were the main purposes of the field trip. Bill Kappell, who retired from the US Geological Survey, helped facilitate the field trip, leading the students through the mudboils off Tully Farms Road. Students at the high school level who are interested in this topic are invited to join Environmental Club or speak to Mrs. Tucker for more information.

From Your SRO

A few reminders from your SRO to keep our students, parents, and staff safe while on campus this winter:

- ◆ Students should dress appropriately for the weather each day.
